

Land-Based Navy Planes Keep Sharp Eye for Subs

VAL BASE, June 1.—(U)—
Flying far out to sea in a co-
ordinated service with
the fleet, land-based navy planes
keep a sharp eye for submarines
in the battle of the Atlantic.
These sentries of the air work

fleet, patrolling the sea channels ahead
of the surface craft to perform
their duties in the immediate vicin-
ity of the convoy.

224,752 in Gifts Acknowledged by UO

In a 12-page booklet released
last night, the university acknowl-
edges gifts totaling \$224,752.35 in
addition to gifts over than cash,
valued by all departments during
the school year.
Of the total, the medical school
was the chief beneficiary with
\$77,040. The library received a
total of \$1,403.87 in addition to
approximately 5,000 volumes and
magazines from established endow-
ments designated to the university.
Other departments and
general university fund re-
ceived \$96,300.51.

The largest single gift, from the
estate of the late Mrs. Rose M.
Hollenbeck, included cash and
property valued at \$25,944.16.
Student aid through federal agen-
cies came to \$15,390 and a fed-
eral art collection gift was val-
ued at \$8,000.
The art school also received \$5,-
000 from the Miss Margaret M.
Wagner estate. The Murray-War-
ner Museum of Oriental Art re-
ceived a \$3,588.25 contribution
from Mrs. Gertrude Bass Warner.
The League of Oregon Cities gave
\$2,000 and the Oregon Mothers' Club
\$1,100.

A library collection was estab-
lished by a \$1,040 gift from the
estate of the late library staff
member, Miss Ethel Sawyer. Prop-
erty given by J. Hugh Pruett and
Mrs. Hope M. Pruett was sold for
\$1,000 to purchase a high grade
telescope.
Friends of the university con-
tributed \$1,680 for a fund to pur-
chase scientific equipment. The es-
tate of S. Julia Burgess contrib-
uted a \$1,000 endowment to be used
for poetry prizes each year.

The Oregon Bar association and
the American Philosophical society
gave \$781.68 and \$550 respec-
tively.
Dr. Burt Brown Parker, Port-
land, gave \$150 to establish a his-
torical book collection and the
National Society of Sigma Xi made
a \$50 gift. Laura M. Heckart
gave \$500 to the student loan fund.
Donations from long established en-
dowments, memorials, and schol-
arships, contributed to the medi-
cal school as well as the univer-
sity at large.

Rufus C. Holman, the Eugene
Spencers' club, Mu Phi Epsilon
Fraternity association, C. P. Till-
man, Eugene, T. Neil Taylor, Oak-
land, California, and the Edison
Marshall-Ernest Haycox - Robert
Lane story fund contributed
\$10 each.
The medical school received
gifts from the Portland Academy
of Medicine, the Multnomah
County Medical society, John C.
Higgins, New York, Portland Vet-
erinary medical association, the
Office of Scientific Research and
Development, Abbott Laboratories
and the Appella corporation.
The Jackson memorial, Ken-
neth A. J. MacKenzie memorial,
U. S. Public Health service, the
Dr. Robert Rinehart, Portland,
made contributions to further in-
struction.

Student aid was increased by
donations from the C. H. Strow-
bridge scholarship, the Dr. Esther
Pohl Lovejoy memorial, and the
W. K. Kellogg foundation.

ment, and miscellaneous non cash
requests were also acknowledged
in the booklet. Th. Doernbecher

STRAWBERRY PRESERVES
4 lbs. berries 3 lbs. sugar
Pick over, wash, and hull the berries. Add the sugar to the strawberries, and heat gently until the sugar dissolves and the juice is drawn from the berries. Cook rapidly until the fruit is plump and transparent and the syrup thick. Pack carefully in clean, hot jars and seal. All berries except blackberries may be made into preserves by this method.
