Tax Bill Awaits FDR's Signature

WASHINGTON, June 3.—(AP)—American income taxpayers today awaited President Roosevelt's decision whether they shall pick themselves up by the financial boot straps and become current on their bills with Uncle Sam.

Before the president is a compromise measure approved by overwhelming votes in both houses of congress which will put 44,000,000 persons on a pay-as-you-go basis if Mr. Roosevelt signs it, as congressional leaders are reported to have received new assurances he will do. The measure was sent to the White House by a 62 to 19 senate vote yesterday.

Eugene Pilot Brings Bomber Through Battle

The exploit of an American Flying Fortress, "Spawn of Hell," piloted by a Eugene man, Second Lieutenant Henry Evans, formed the basis of a news dispatch Thursday by the Associated Press. The ship, on armed reconnaissance over the north coast of New Guinea, was attacked by 16 Japanese Zero planes, fought them for 35 minutes at altitudes varying from 200 to 13,000 feet, shot down five of the enemy craft, possibly six, and finally made it back to the base.

Lt. Evans, according to the dispatch, took his plane out to sea and ducked in and out of a low cloud cover, nursing the plane along on two and a half engines. Every time the bomber reappeared in the open, Zeros would swarm about it. When the Fortress reached base, gas was streaming from punctured tanks, the hydraulic system was shot out and the brake system inoperative. It bore 31 cannon holes and uncounted numbers of holes from machine gun bullets.

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their suitcase and go to Washington for a month. "It would be the best college education you could get, I guarantee," Willmore said. Speaking of the OPA rent control set up, Willmore declared "There is more gestapo in this rent control setup than the countries of Europe ever heard of. That is not my opinion alone. It is the word of the Smith committee investigating," he declared. Realtors are not opposed to rent control, they are opposed to the way it is being administered, he said.

"The year 1943 will be a year of sacrifice," Mr. Willmore declared, adding, "but people are generally in a mood to sacrifice. After all, sacrifice is the greatest contribution to the building of a soul." The greater the sacrifice this year the stronger we are likely to be in character and ideals in 1944 to meet the problems that are ahead of us, he said. Speaking to those of his own profession, the national realty president said: "The realtor must keep up the home front for home ownership. Home ownership is the backbone of America and American institutions. It is not generally realized that the family and the home are more important during wartime than in peace—the boys at the front are fighting for the dear ones at home. They are not fighting for the capitol of their state or for Washington. They are fighting for home and home is America to them. Home is worth fighting for, yes dying for. Too few people today have any feeling of responsibility for their home and country."

Second only to winning the war we must preserve free private enterprise, Willmore stated. "Under free enterprise our people have attained a scale of living never before dreamed of by people on the face of the globe. Only by one's own individual initiative can there be material gain—and someone must provide materially before there can be social gains. Government can not provide it—it does not produce—it can distribute the savings of others," he said.

So long as we have a free press we will be able to have free enterprise—opportunity and initiative will be ours, Willmore said. Next to winning the war the most important thing for this and future generations is an absolutely free, unbridled, uncontrolled press—only that kind of a press can save free enterprise, initiative, and opportunity for all, he added. Mr. Willmore strongly criticized the attempt to circumvent the press on the United Nations food conference. "Blandly, the president told Washington correspondents at his press conference that he did not think they ought to cover the meeting. He told them that things would go a lot more smoothly if newspaper reporters were not around to bother delegates at the sessions. In short, at the first United Nations conference to be conducted in this country, he wanted to freeze out the press. And this at a conference of free nations meeting down in Thomas Jefferson's own Virginia countryside! That great apostle of democracy and the press must have turned over in his grave at the news," he declared.

"Talk about 'black markets'! By deliberate suppression of the news at the source, our government has guaranteed a rumor market at Hot Springs. . . . These are the things that I mean when I talk about the dangers to our press, to your real estate business, to all business—to free enterprise," he exclaimed.

Going on to government regulations regarding homes, Mr. Willmore said the National Association of Real Estate boards has recommended that OPA regulations be amended to eliminate the one-third down payment as now required under rent control. "The result of OPA's unfair ruling of one-third down payment actually means that the door of home ownership is shut in the faces of millions of those in the lower income group," Mr. Willmore said. "Americans will stand for a lot of rationing, but when government seeks to ration a man's right to own a home, it's time to do something about it," he declared.

heads alternating in presiding.

General Georges Catroux, who was liaison officer between Gen. Giraud and Gen. De Gaulle, was named successor to Marcel Peyroux as governor general of Algeria and also designated to be in charge of Moslem affairs throughout the French empire.

The committee also voted the removal of General Jean Mendigal as chief of the French air force in North Africa, naming General Buscat to succeed him.

It also voted the removal of General Jean Marie Berget as commander of the French West Africa air force.

Whether Gen. Giraud is to remain commander-in-chief is scheduled to be decided tomorrow.

Following the meeting at which the organization was formalized as the governing body for liberated French territory, political quarters reported important changes would be made in the leadership for Algeria and French Morocco.

Formal announcement of the establishment of the committee was made by De Gaulle to newspaper correspondents tonight at his headquarters.

"The committee was constituted

this morning with Gen. Giraud and myself as president," De Gaulle said. "It forms the French central power; it directs all French forces in every sovereignty in French territory and directs the war effort."

dustrial areas or in rural areas.

"The need for doctors on the home front to intensify their knowledge of surgery can be seen in the increased number of accidents among war workers. During the decade before the war, there was a 60 per cent decline in industrial accidents, bringing the annual death toll to around 15,000; but, according to government reports, the overall rate has advanced rapidly since the beginning of war production in 1941.

"In August, 1942, nine million workers were in war industries, but this number is expected to be doubled by the end of this year. Based upon this and previous employment increases, the National Safety council estimates that this year will see at least a 20 per cent increase in the 1941 figures of 350,000 persons permanently injured, and 3,750,000 temporarily maimed. The loss of man-days of work, and money lost from these

injuries, makes the industrial accident problem one of the most important wartime issues."

TON OF MEAT BURNS

ALBANY, June 3.—(AP)—Fire which destroyed a ton of meat and meat products at the Kampfer brothers market here increased southern Oregon's food problem today. Most of the burned stock, largely hams and bacon, was for shipment to Grants Pass and Med-

ford, where meat shortages have been reported, said Manager Alvin Kampfer.

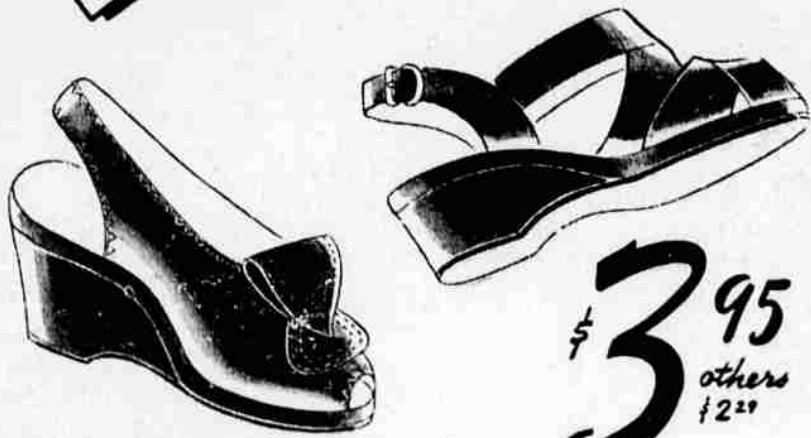
