

Minister Is Chosen For Local Church

Rev. Wesley Goodson Nicholson of Pasadena, Cal., has accepted the call of the First Congregational church of Eugene, to become its pastor, filling a vacancy left by the departure of Dr. Williston Wirt in February to become an army chaplain.

Mr. Nicholson, who was the guest minister at the local church on Mother's Day, has a background of experience and training particularly fitting, it is felt, for the place he is to assume. He has been especially active among students of U.C.L.A. and has a record of successful work among them. He is at present the associate minister of the "Church of Youth" of the First Congregational church of Los Angeles, under direction of Dr. James Field, Jr. Before this, he was for several years pastor of the Westwood Hills Congregational church of Los Angeles, located near the campus of the University of California.

Mr. Nicholson will be accompanied to Eugene by his wife. Both are graduates of Mt. Olivet college of Michigan, and Mr. Nicholson also is a graduate of the Harvard Divinity school of Harvard college.

Ford Inheritance Tax Made Smaller By Gifts

DETROIT, June 4. — (AP) — The will of Edsel Bryant Ford was filed for probate today and, because it bequeathed the greater part of his Ford Motor company stock to the Ford foundation, attorneys estimated estate inheritance and transfer taxes might not amount to much more than \$12,000,000. Earlier reports, based solely upon conjecture, had placed the possible tax at as much as \$200,000,000.

Attorneys said the estate itself probably would amount to \$200,000,000.

The Ford foundation, a non-profit corporation, was organized in 1936 for educational and other purposes. Gifts to organizations of its type are not taxable.

36,688 Prisoners Of War in America

WASHINGTON, June 5. — (AP) — A total of 36,688 enemy prisoners of war are being held in 21 prison camps in the United States, the war department announced today.

The prisoners include 22,110 Germans, 14,516 Italians and 62 Japanese.

German prisoners are housed in Camp Breckinridge, Ky.; Camp Chaffee, Ark.; Crossville, Tenn.; Camp Gruber, Okla.; Hereford, Tex.; Huntsville, Tex.; Roswell, N. M.; Stringtown, Okla.; Angel Island, Cal.; Camp Blanding, Fla., and Ft. Meade, Md.

Italian prisoners are in Camp Atterbury, Ind.; Camp Carson, Colo.; Camp Clark, Mo.; Crossville, Tenn.; Florence, Ariz.; Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo.; Ogden, Utah; Camp Phillips, Kan.; Weingarten, Mo., and Camp Wheeler, Ga.

Canners Protest 'Unfair' OPA Rules

WASHINGTON, June 5. — (AP) — Spokesmen for the canning industry told a congressional committee Wednesday that OPA regulations affecting their operations had been drafted without consulting them and had proved unfair and unworkable.

Appearing before the Smith committee investigating charges that executive agencies have exceeded congressional grants of power, Harold K. Bacheider, president of the Ladoga Canning company of Indianapolis, said the regulations were not drawn "by practical men."

He criticized in particular an order requiring the grading of canned goods on the labels, subsequently amended to require only the designation of the grade in invoices, saying it necessitated "a very grave and radical change in the business methods of the canners."

"Grades," he said, "do not reflect differences in consumer acceptance (of a product). . . . They are nothing more than a bureaucratic effort to make an arbitrary division of each food into a specific number of grades."

Maloney Notes

PORTLAND, June 5. — (AP) — Federal income taxpayers may be denied the advantage of Oregon's new community property law, Internal Revenue Collector J. W. Maloney warned today.

Internal Revenue Commissioner Guy T. Helvering held that the division of income between husband and wife permitted by the law is invalid for income tax purposes, Maloney said. Helvering's ruling objects to the law's option, which allows taxpayers to choose whether or not the law will apply to them.

The Oklahoma law, carrying a similar provision, already has been questioned by the government and is now before the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals and probably will go to the U. S. Supreme Court, Maloney was informed.

Pending a decision, community property returns will be accepted from Oregon taxpayers, Maloney said, but they may require adjustment later.

Oratory Funds Not Depleted

A fund which, like the Biblical widow's oil, has defied depletion, is the Failing and Beekman fund of \$4100, at the University of Oregon, from which annual prizes of \$250 for oratory have been provided 43 times, for a total of \$10,750 and in which there still remains \$4600, or \$500 more than originally allotted.

Dr. James H. Gilbert, dean of the college of liberal arts, noted these figures while presiding at the annual Failing-Beekman-Jewett contests held as a feature of the 1943 commencement season.

The \$2500 which has been invested and yields the \$150 for the first prize was donated in 1889 by Henry Failing, Portland banker; and the \$1600 which provides the \$100 second prize was donated by C. C. Beekman, early-day banker of Jacksonville.

For the last two years a third prize of \$50 has been provided by Mrs. W. F. Jewett of Eugene, in honor of her late husband, and the title of the contest has been amplified to include his name.

Temperature Range Is Wide Last Week

PORTLAND, June 4. — (AP) — Temperatures in Oregon ranged from a low of 30 at Bend to a high of 90 at Maupin during the week ending June 1, the department of commerce-weather bureau farm-weather bulletin showed today.

Rain was infrequent and light, generally.

Winter wheat and barley began to head up in some of the milder areas while in the western counties spring barley was sown. Small grains generally are doing well. Corn planting is nearly finished and early corn is up.

Fruit that escaped damage by frost earlier in the season is doing well in most sections now but a heavy drop of cherries is reported in northern Umatilla county and cherries in Union county are showing effects of unfavorable weather at blossom time. Some strawberries are appearing in market in the milder areas.

Cutting of alfalfa and clover is progressing despite some rain delay. Sheep shearing has made good progress and sheep are moving.

Wierd Tangles Seen In Chaplin Baby Case

HOLLYWOOD, June 5. — (AP) — The Charlie Chaplin paternity case — is the aging comic the father of Joan Barry's forthcoming baby? — reached a crescendo of developments today which made preliminary to the trial of Errol Flynn seem mild by comparison.

One judge ordered Chaplin into court June 17 to answer Miss Barry's charges; another judge ordered Miss Barry into his court June 11 to prove why she should not continue to be classified as a vagrant.

The district attorney pressed an inquiry into the whole weird tangle, which reached its climax when police found the red-haired Miss Barry fainting in an automobile, with poison on her lips, an expectant mother, and clad only in a man's bathrobe.

She claimed she'd just left Chaplin's hillside mansion, where she had gone to seek support of herself and the child she expects in another four months.

Judges issued orders, police denied they'd stripped Miss Barry of her clothes, investigators investigated investigators, and Chaplin made the understatement of the year.

"Here comes trouble," he moaned as two deputies arrived at his house with a subpoena.

Mobile Hospital Service Saves

SAN FRANCISCO, June 5. — (AP) — Read Admiral Ross F. McIntire, surgeon general of the navy and personal physician to President Roosevelt, today credited mobile hospitals in the South Pacific with the low mortality rate in the present war.

"Wounded men in the South Pacific area usually are taken to hospitals in 12 to 24 hours," he said.

"Modern methods of handling the wounded and to combat shock, blood banks, sulfa drugs, and knowledge of first aid possessed by all enlisted men have aided in lowering mortalities," Adm. McIntire said.

He said the navy expects to move Bay Area and Seattle wounded service men to hospitals at Yosemite, Sun Valley and Tongue Point, Ore., within two weeks. The three hospitals have a bed capacity of approximately 2,900. The Alhambra hotel at Yosemite is being converted into a hospital, he said.

The total number of navy hospital beds in the continental United States will be boosted from 60,000 to 80,000 by June 1944, according to Adm. McIntire.
