## CAP Organization Set Up At Grove

COTTAGE GROVE—The Tuesday organization meeting of the Cottage Grove flight of the civil air patrol concluded with the showing of application papers of 14 enlistees. Although there were only 14 enlistees, a few more are to be brought into the ranks soon. The quota that Cottage Grove would like to fill is between 25 and 30. With this meeting classes were started in infantry drill and classes are scheduled to be held in first aid. By July these courses are expected to be completed and the enlistees may then go into uniform. Twenty-five hours of training must be completed before a person may go into uniform. This is a new rule which has gone into effect since the army air force took control of the C.A.P. a few weeks ago. The organization of C.A.P. is set up and patterned after the organization of the army air force, with the president of the United States as commander-in-chief. The C.A.P. is definitely a national defense aid to supplement military effort. Special uniforms are worn by the C.A.P. officers and members. Military discipline is maintained. Awards have been developed by the aviation planning staff of C.A.P. Service is altogether voluntary. The purpose of C.A.P. is to utilize the time spent in casual flying or other aviation activity. C.A.P. will furnish an objective enabling one to take a more worthwhile part in both aviation and the national defense. Any citizen pilot of good character, certificated by the C.A.P. in the grade of private pilot or higher grade, any citizen of good character, holding a government certificate for any skill or experience related to aviation, such as A. and E. mechanic, control tower operator, radio telephone operator, etc., is eligible. Any citizen of good character who will volunteer for clerical work, driving of cars or ambulances, watchman, first aid instruction, or kindred service, may be in auxiliary duty. Any citizen of good character who will undertake mechanic, airport supervision, control tower or other instruction under the training program of the C.A.P. may be in apprentice duty. No one under 18 years of age may enroll in the C.A.P. No one under 18 years of age will be accepted for flight duty. All applicants under 21 years of age must present with their application a signed letter of permission from their parents or guardians. Women may enroll.

Those wishing to enlist, although the organization meeting has been held, will be given an opportunity to do so at a meeting scheduled to be held in the council room of the city hall, in Cottage Grove, at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, June 8.

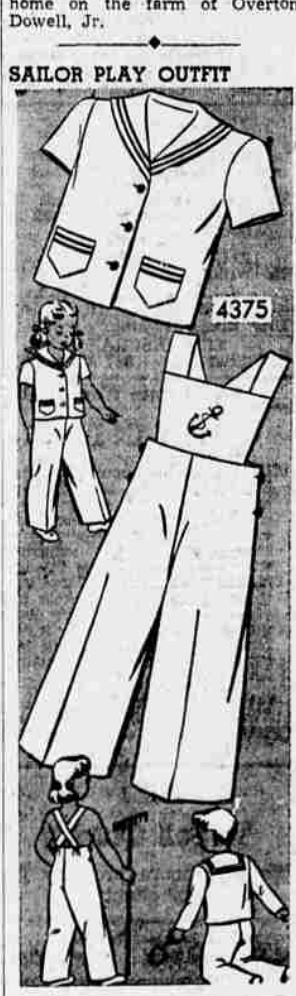
