

Local Boys Qualify For Cadet Training

An army medical examiner will be in the Eugene recruiting office at the post office Friday and Saturday to make the physical examinations of those men who qualified this week for aviation cadet training. Major Eric Shilling announced Friday morning.

Major Shilling advises that these cadet candidates get in touch with Lieutenant B. A. Martin, acting commander of the civil air patrol, for information regarding preparation for their training when called to active duty. The CAP has been authorized by war department to lend its facilities and aid in the development of the aviation cadet training program, and is equipped to give proper instruction in the subjects pursued in the training course, Major Shilling explained.

During Wednesday and Thursday the aviation cadet examining board qualified a larger number of men for aviation training, for such a period, than in any other city in Oregon during the last two months. Sixty-two young men passed the examination qualifying them for this training.

Because of the tremendous interest shown by Eugene youths who desire to fly as members of the army air force, Major Shilling hopes to make it possible for such men to take their entrance examinations at any time they desire at the Eugene recruiting office.

Milk Drop Seen For December

WASHINGTON, (U.S.)—Charles W. Holman, secretary of the co-operative milk producers federation, has predicted a six per cent decline in December milk production, criticized the proposed milk subsidy, and blamed President Roosevelt's hold-the-line executive order for present conditions in the industry.

Testifying before the food subcommittee of the senate agricultural committee in opposition to the administration's proposed \$60,000,000 milk price subsidy for the next three months, Holman denied that it would increase production.

It would not overcome, he said, the increase of 51 cents a hundred weight in the cost of milk production and would mean a reduction of only one-half to one cent a quart in the prices paid by consumers in various areas. This cut to consumers, he insisted, did not justify a subsidy, the burden of which would be passed on to taxpayers after the war.

Blaming the president's hold-the-line order for present milk difficulties, Holman said the order, in effect, defeated the purposes of the price control act.

Sen. Scott W. Lucas, (D-Ill.), asked whether congress was "wise" in passing the price control act.

"That act," Holman replied, "is something different from the executive (hold-the-line) order which, in effect, froze the administration of the act itself. If the act had been followed as it was passed things would be different. But the executive order froze everything at the Sept. 1, 1942 level and is, to some extent, responsible for conditions."

Ted Niedo Sentenced For Draft Evasion

Ted Perez Niedo, Seattle port of embarkation medical department chemist, today was sentenced in that city to three and a half years imprisonment on conviction of failing to answer a draft call. He was described as a graduate of Seattle college and a former pre-medic student at the University of Oregon and chemistry student at Pacific university.

Niedo was deferred while in college and appealed a later IAA classification on the ground he was a conscientious objector because his mother had told him not to.

"While at first he seemed willing to go into service," commented Judge John C. Bowen, "later on he became aware of the opportunities of high wages in the shipyards and said he turned conscientious objector."

Howard Needham New Head of Toastmasters

Howard Needham has been elected new president of the Eugene Toastmasters club, it was revealed today. He replaces John Quiner, the new deputy governor.

Other new officers are R. Grant Crakes, vice-president, and Mervin O. Dahl, secretary-treasurer. They will be installed at the next Toastmasters meeting Tuesday evening at the Eugene hotel, when the topic will be improving Eugene. Crakes will act as toastmaster.

Cox Resigns After Bitter FCC Feud

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Rep. Cox (D-Ga.) who has been engaged in a bitter feud with members of the federal communications commission in his capacity as head of a special committee to investigate the FCC, today resigned the chairmanship of the committee.

Cox announced his resignation to the house after conferring with Speaker Rayburn. His resignation had been pending since a petition filed on May 13 with a member of the FCC, who charged that Cox was unfit to conduct the investigation because of a connection with an Albany, Ga., radio station which had business pending before the commission.

All of the foregoing was known to officials here and some of it to newspapermen, including this correspondent, who received it under a pledge of secrecy.

month's quota. The objective is for local boards to fill their quotas in the first call from available single and childless married men so far as possible. If they can't they are to report a deficit.

The second quotas will be issued as soon as the first call inductions are tabulated. Local boards are under instruction to call non-fathers first in the cleanup call as far as possible.

The second call allows for no deficit to prevent the induction of pre-war fathers, however, thus, the induction of some fathers in some states by the end of this month appears inevitable.

Selective service officials estimate that 446,000 of the 5,000,000 such fathers must be drafted by the end of this year to fill army and navy demands for 1,200,000 additional men by that time.

Occupation, family hardship and physical, mental or moral deficiencies will be the only ground for deferment and selective service expects to get the 446,000 without taking a single father who is engaged in a job essential to the war effort.

Yes, the fuhrer had better maintain his line! If we are to believe German broadcasts, that's what the all highest is determined to do, for he is said to have established headquarters on the Russian front and decreed that his generals shall not yield "another foot of ground" beyond the prepared nazi positions west of the Dnieper, which now has been reached and is the scene of many bloody battles for control of the main crossings of this third greatest river of Europe.

The climactic struggle which is going on along most of the thousand mile front, from Leningrad to the Sea of Azov, should give us an indication soon whether the Germans will be able to maintain themselves along the natural line of the Dnieper. Their alternative will be to resume their highly dangerous withdrawal into Poland.

Small Plants First For Civilian Goods

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—Small manufacturing plants will get first call when the production of essential civilian goods is expanded, the smaller war plants corporation said here.

The bi-monthly report of Robert W. Johnson SWPC chairman, to Donald M. Nelson, war production board chairman, said full collaboration with the office of civilian requirements has been established, and the facilities of smaller factories will be used first when civilian goods production is stepped up.

This is only one method by which smaller plants in difficulties because of the war dislocation are being aided, Johnson reported.

He pointed out that SWPC had aided in the placement of \$217,733,000 in prime contracts, in addition to subcontracts totaling \$35,597,000 let to small producers.
