Charged with being a fugitive from justice, Edward Augustus DeWayne Dunn of Seattle was in the Lane county jail Friday. He was brought out from Florence by Constable and Deputy Sheriff C. S. Carlson of that place Thursday afternoon. Carlson said Dunn was apprehended by the guard and state police officers on the Siuslaw bridge at Florence Wednesday night when he failed to dim the lights of his car. The officers say he is accused of car theft and other offenses at Seattle. He was held by the justice of the peace at Florence with \$2500 bail.

Two Men Held for Local Burglaries Robert John Neff and Daniel James Miller, who told officers they are from Minnesota, were brought to Eugene from Roseburg Friday and lodged in the county jail, accused of a number of burglaries and thefts in Lane county. State police arrested them at Roseburg.

Officers say they suspect these men of entering the office of the King and Lengacher Lumber company, on the outskirts of Eugene, Tuesday night and stealing some cigarettes, postage stamps, gasoline rationing stamps for 1150 gallons and 12 company checks on a local bank. Then they stole a car belonging to Mrs. V. M. Mortensen, 1348 Sixth Avenue west, state police officers claim, and drove to Reed's service station and grocery store three and a half miles south of Cottage Grove, where they are accused of stealing gasoline, oil and groceries. Driving on into Douglas county, they assertedly stole some gasoline from a farmer, finally landing up in jail at Roseburg.

Dairymen Must Keep Full Records PORTLAND, Ore.—(U.P.)—Oregon dairy farmers were requested to keep records on feed costs and sales of whole milk and butterfat as a basis for receiving subsidies under a program the federal government will launch Friday.

R. B. Taylor of Corvallis, chairman of the state USDA war board, said in Portland a telegram from the western division of the AAA instructed county war boards to advise the farmers the records would be required. Other details on the program, which will continue until Dec. 31, were awaited by the state board.

1943 Oregon Again Rated All-American

The Oregon, student year book at the University of Oregon, won all-American rating, the highest award a college annual can earn, for the eighth time with its 1943 book, Helen Johnson of Sheridan, editor of the 1944 Oregon, announced this week.

Editor of the 1943 year book was J. Wesley Sullivan, Portland, who is now in the air force and is temporarily stationed at Santa Ana, Cal. Jeff Kitchen, Bend, who was business manager of the 1943 Oregon, is now in Washington, D. C.

The award was made by the National Scholastic Press association. The Oregon year book was graded with those of schools having an enrollment of 2,500 to 5,000, and received the highest number of points of any year book in the United States.

The award-winning year book was based on a military theme and was dedicated to University of Oregon alumni serving in the armed forces. Special features of the 1943 Oregon included cartoons of Donald Duck, Oregon mascot, drawn by Walt Disney productions and depicting Donald in various campus activities; colored photographs of university buildings, and reproductions of murals which appear on the university library walls.

Largest Tuna School Sighted on Coast

ASTORIA, Ore.—(U.P.)—The biggest tuna school ever sighted off the Oregon coast drew the Columbia river fishing fleet south this week.

The school, extending several miles, was located ten miles off Cannon beach. A radio report from the Columbia river packers association tender, Unga, said fishermen were landing tuna as fast as they could toss in lines.

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Permits for Slash Burning Available

It is now permissible to issue permits for slash and brush burning, provided that such permits should be limited for as short a time as necessary to complete the burning, is the word received by Charles Gold, valley fire warden for the state board of forestry.

N. S. Rogers, state forester, in a letter to Gold, says that permits should be instructed to start fires early in the morning and then let them die down before dark. The following suggestions relative to the safe procedure in burning slash should be mentioned at the time of issuing the permit, the forester says:

1. Start fires on the top of hills and burn down hill.
2. Have safe fire breaks around slash area before burning starts. Fire breaks may be burned around edges before setting the main slash on fire.
3. Have sufficient help and fire fighting tools to combat fire if it escapes.
4. Do not set on fire any slashing on days when fire will burn in green timber.
5. Wherever possible pile slashing or debris before burning.
6. Be sure all slash fires are completely out before leaving. Never leave any fire unattended.
7. Do not burn during a high wind.

Milk Production Fell in Last Week

Milk production in Oregon declined during the week ending September 28, the U. S. department of commerce and the weather bureau reported Thursday.

Pastures were suffering from drying winds and a lack of rain, although weather conditions have been favorable for harvest and threshing. Seeding progressed rapidly, and early seeded grain was developing well.

With the harvest of peaches and early pears nearly completed, pickers were well underway with early apples, late pears, and prunes. Some prunes remained on the trees for drying.

Large supplies of fast-ripening tomatoes went to the market during the week. Most of the commercial potato crop reached maturity, although late potatoes in western Oregon were slightly injured by drought.

An unusual range of temperatures occurred during the week, from a top of 100 degrees at Medford to a low of 30 in Bend and Madras. Scanty rainfall was restricted to western Oregon.
