Bond Redemptions Highest Last Month

WASHINGTON.—Redemptions of war savings bonds during September climbed to \$155,278,000, the highest for any month on record. Treasury officials were not alarmed however, inasmuch as the total was only about \$3,000,000 above the previous high of \$152,044,000 in August.

In view of heavy payments required of some 14,000,000 taxpayers when they filed their declarations of estimated 1943 income and victory tax Sept. 15, the increase in bond redemptions was not regarded as surprising.

During the first quarter of the 1944 fiscal year, for which the treasury closed its books today, bond redemptions totaled \$445,565,000 as compared with \$91,925,000 in the corresponding months of last year.

Government spending reached the total of \$22,264,000,000 for the quarter, well over one-third more than in the same month of 1942. War spending accounted for \$20,616,000,000 of the total.

War spending in September amounted to \$6,952,000,000, less than August's \$7,232,000,000 but more than July's \$6,431,000,000.

The public debt soared to \$122,320,000,000 on the last day of September, compared with \$91,057,000,000 on the corresponding date a year ago. The increase during the first quarter of the fiscal year was \$21,524,000,000.

Government revenue rose to \$10,175,000,000, a little more than two and one-half times the amount collected in the first three months of the preceding fiscal year. Withholding taxes amounted to \$1,240,000,000 and other income taxes to \$6,342,000,000 for a total nearly three times the amount collected in the same month of 1942.
