

Seabee Openings Being Filled Fast

A warning for persons who are interested in the navy's construction battalions (Seabees) to take action as soon as possible has been issued by Chief Specialist W. E. Bell, in charge of the Eugene navy recruiting station.

Although the Seabees are still accepting voluntary enlistments, the nation during the past few months has contributed so many recruits that the quotas are becoming exhausted and it may be that all the openings soon will be gone.

"Men who are looking for the place in this war effort where their skill or handwork can best be utilized, can find it in the Seabees," declared the recruiter. "But I want to urge them to act now before the situation changes and they can no longer get into the branch of the service they prefer. Those who are interested in the Seabees are asked to come to the recruiting station without delay in order to take advantage of the jobs now available," the recruiter added.

State OPA Head to Discuss OPA Future

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Lumber has stepped into the forefront of the country's critical war materials, while aluminum supply has been expanded sufficiently to permit new stock-piling of virgin aluminum ingots, war production board sources said.

The possibility of new controls over lumber was seen in the disclosure that military demands, both for construction overseas and for the crating and packaging of weapons and war materials, had brought that once plentiful material into the top urgency category.

Building Starts Soon at Mapleton

Preliminary work on a big federal housing project at Mapleton is now under way and construction on the buildings is expected to start in the near future, is the word brought to Eugene by P. M. Morse, county engineer, who was at Mapleton on official business Monday.

The site of the project lies on the hillside opposite the big new mill of the Siuslaw Forest Products company and up the hill from the highway and S. P. railway track. It is quite level there and little excavation will have to be made, the engineer said.

Thirty units, each accommodating six families, will be built. The site covers about five acres of land. This project will provide housing for the families of numerous men now employed in the big sawmill of the Siuslaw Forest Products company. Ever since the mill began operations last summer Mapleton has been badly crowded and it is now impossible for new arrivals to obtain places to live.

Lebanon is another city in this region to obtain a federal housing project. The frame work of the residences is now up and the work is being rushed. This project is located in the western part of that city.
