### What Goes on at The Statehouse

 SALEM, Ore., Oct. 21—(U.P.)—Administration of the 1943 Oregon vehicle safety responsibility act has uncovered instances of lack of cooperation on the part of some insurance companies, the secretary of state's office said.

One example is the case of motorists who assertedly have been refused liability policies by companies to which they have applied, and yet have been licensed by the state to operate motor vehicles. Another has occurred where some insurance companies assertedly have failed to report to the state department persons and vehicles covered by standard liability policies.

The assigned risk book worked out and sponsored at the 1943 session by insurance companies as a provision of the safety responsibility act was supposed to guarantee means by which drivers who were classified "bad risks" could obtain policies to protect financially those with whom they might collide in the future.

Under the act a motorist rejected by three companies may be assigned to one of the companies and obtain insurance—at a higher rate than if his record were clear. Reports received by the secretary of state's office showed that some drivers were refused insurance on the basis of advanced age or physical disabilities, although these did not prevent them from getting drivers' licenses.

During arguments on the bill insurance men declared that perhaps 15 per cent of the motorists would be undesirable risks. The law gives them the right to reject those whose records are too bad.

Meanwhile informed statehouse sources say there is more than a good chance the 1945 legislative session may create a compulsory assigned risk pool—such as Massachusetts operates—where liability insurance is required of every motorist regardless of whether he becomes involved in an accident.

Night, football, baseball and other sports for which there is public demand are permissible under the new dimout rules, according to Jerrold Owen, Oregon civilian defense administrator.

These are general restrictions, and proposed variations will be considered if applications, prepared in triplicate and addressed to the ninth regional civilian defense board, are mailed to the Oregon State Defense Council at Salem.

Ranking almost equally in importance is the raid made on the oil refineries at Ploesti, Rumania, which also proved very expensive in heavy bombers. Rumanian fields, to which the Ploesti refineries are the bottleneck, produced 30 per cent of Germany's total oil supply, crude and synthetic. Hungarian fields, the other main natural source available to the Germans, produced about eight per cent. The long distance air raid from North Africa crippled Ploesti's output. Allied military authorities everywhere hailed it as a signal victory and one which after some months would virtually diminish Nazi oil resources, especially in aviation gasoline and high-grade lubricants.
