

Miss Florence Alden Retires From University Faculty Post

After 22 years at the University of Oregon, where she was head of the women's physical education department, Miss Florence D. Alden has retired, but plans to continue living in Eugene and do a few of the things she has always wanted to do. For one thing, this winter she will study music at the university.

Miss Alden, who is a graduate of Smith college, Northampton, Mass., as well as an alumna of Wellesley, majoring there in physical education, did graduate work at New York university and at the Teachers college of Columbia university. She is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, national scholastic honor society, and Pi Lambda Theta, women's education honorary.

At the time she came to the University of Oregon, Gerlinger hall had just been completed, and the women's physical education facilities were known up and down the coast for their excellence.

Last year Miss Alden devoted part time to managing the city's playground and recreation program in which she was particularly interested. During the summer she devoted full time to this work.

Before coming to the University of Oregon, Miss Alden was on the staff of the Central School of Physical Education of New York. She was also successively head of physical education for women at

the University of Missouri, at the Omaha Y.W.C.A., at the Bryn Mawr preparatory school, Baltimore; and of playground and recreation work for women and children under the playground athletic league at Baltimore.

Eugene High School News

At a student council meeting October 21, an idea for "planned" study was proposed, and discussed.

Roll room 215 suggested that teachers giving one or two assignments during the week plan their work so as to give a math assignment one day, a social problem assignment the next day, a science assignment the next, etc. Malcolm Karr, student-body president, appointed Dave Stone, Warren Webster, and Amy Lou Ware to look into the matter.

Harry B. Johnson, principal asked that the names of Miss Carolyn Woods, Glen Griffith, Art Holman, and Mrs. Lora Nidever be added as teacher members of the assembly committee.

Permission was granted to the Junior class to hold a talent assembly December 3 and a dance December 13, to the Mask and Dagger to hold a pay assembly October 29, and to the girls' league for an assembly November 18.

The council accepted John Revell as this year's football manager.

The faculties of Eugene vocational school, Francis Willard and Eugene high were in charge of the issuing of ration book four in the Eugene high school library, October 28, 29, and 30. The hours were from 3 p. m. to 9 p. m. on Thursday and Friday and from 9 a. m. to 9 p. m. on Saturday.

The teachers were on duty in shifts of three hours each.

Teachers' Institute was held Wednesday, October 27, at Woodrow Wilson school. Talks were planned by Dr. J. F. Cramer, superintendent of Eugene schools, and Dr. Frank Parr, executive secretary of the Oregon State Teachers' association.

Speakers were Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction; Miss Joy Hills from the state department of education, and Dr. Victor P. Morris from the University of Oregon.

Courses were not held in any of the Eugene schools on that day.

Every year the girls' league earns an average of \$100 on the sale of Christmas cards. This year, selling began two weeks ago and will continue until the last box is sold.

Boxes sell for a dollar each. The league earns half of this on every box. Not only holiday cards, but also unusual Christmas wrappings and assorted cards are being sold.
