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Himmler Planning Third World War

LONDON.—Gestapo Chief Heinrich Himmler and a powerful clique of Nazi leaders are organizing an underground movement to keep the party alive after Germany's defeat and lay the groundwork for another attempt at world conquest, usually reliable sources said.

These informants, who are in close touch with Germany, said fear of an imminent collapse was spreading even through the higher-ups in the Reich and that a number of prominent Nazi journalists have fled to neutral countries recently or quit their newspaper work in anticipation of the

breakdown. Himmler and a group of high officials in the Nazi elite guard and storm trooper organizations, these sources said, have made secret plans to sabotage the allied occupation armies during a 10 or 20 year period after the armistice. They also envisage a resumption of clandestine rearmament in Germany, such as occurred between 1923 and 1933.

Selling of 'Unsafe' Anti-Freeze Banned

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—(AP)—The War Production board has forbidden all sales of an estimated 500,000 gallons of what it described as "destructive" types of anti-freeze solution.

The 22 brands of anti-freeze named by the WPB were barred from manufacture last January 20, but WPB said some or all of the inventory in dealers' hands might be purchased by "unsuspecting vehicle owners."

The solutions banned are generally cheaper than the two types designated as safe alcohol and ethylene-glycol—but have been declared by the national bureau of standards, WPB said, to be injurious to radiators, rubber hose connections, ignition systems, and water pumps.
