

Price Ceilings Set On Ammunitions

Price ceilings on ammunitions, under the ceilings recently established by OPA, are considerably lower than prices during the fall of the 1942 hunting season, the war price and rationing board advised prospective hunters here Saturday.

These nationwide retail ceilings, which became effective October 7, 1943, are not only a saving to the civilian purchaser of shotgun and rifle cartridges through the regular seller, but they will help to curb the black marketing of those who have been selling shotgun shells.

Following are the highest retail prices that a dealer may legally charge:

In some communities, black markets in shells are flourishing, even to the point where operators have been bold enough to advertise in magazines and newspapers that they can supply hunters with shells and cartridges at exorbitant prices—three and four times as much as the above ceilings. The enforcement division of OPA is investigating and prosecuting such cases.

Buyers are asked to assist in preventing and eliminating black markets by paying no more than the listed ceilings.

Life and Times of Jesus, No. 4, 12-hour course, hours 9:45 to 11:45 a.m.

The introductory lesson is free to all who sign for courses of study.

Mrs. Armstrong is recommended as one of the outstanding Bible teachers, by leaders in educational and denominational fields. Her lectures are entirely free of doctrinal interpretation.

Plots for Fertilizer Demonstrations Started

Dan Young, assistant county agent, during the past week established three trial fertilizer demonstration plots on fall seeded pastures, thus making a total of seven established in different parts of the county this fall.

Two of the trial plots are on the farm of the Grimes brothers, two miles west of Eugene, on two different types of soil, and the third is on the farm of E. L. Clark and son, two miles south of Creswell.

The purpose of these demonstrations is to see if high nitrogen fertilizer and superphosphates applied at seeding time in the fall will get the pasture off to a better start. The results will be checked next spring.

FSA Official Will Speak Over Radio

Genevieve Nettleton, associate supervisor in the Eugene farm security administration offices, will speak over radio station KOAC Monday at 6:30 p.m., on behalf of the national "Food fights for Freedom" month which is being observed during November.

The November theme is that Americans, for the first time since the Pilgrim fathers bowed their heads, have a reason to thank God for the food production of the American farmers.

Cooperation Given On Dairy Feed Plan

All Lane county buyers of milk and butterfat products in Lane county are cooperating with the AAA in the matter of dairy feed payments under the program to protect dairy farmers against increased feed costs.

The creameries and other buyers this week will mail a copy of a letter written by George W. Platt, chairman of the county committee, with the checks being sent to the producers, and it is expected that 1500 will have been sent out by the end of the week. This letter calls attention to the feed payments to which the producers are entitled.

Applications for payment on products produced and sold during October will be accepted at the county AAA office in the Producers Public Market building in Eugene beginning on Monday. Producers filing applications will need milk statements, receipts or other evidence showing the amount of dairy products sold during October. The applications will have to be filed by November 30 and the county committee expects to complete all payments on October production this month.

It will not be necessary for producers of dairy products to call at the AAA office in person to file their applications. Producers are urged to mail their statements and other evidence of sales to the AAA office to avoid congestion and delay. As soon as these are received applications will be prepared and mailed to the producers for their signatures. All letters and evidence of sales should be mailed to County AAA Committee, P. O. Box 1227, Eugene, Ore. All statements and other evidence will be returned to the producer.

The second payment under the program will be made in January and will cover sales of dairy products during November and December. All payments are for cow's milk and butterfat; none on goat milk and butterfat.

E. S. Addison, Lorane Pioneer, Passes

Edmond Seward Addison, 71, a resident of the Lorane community for 60 years, died Thursday in Eugene, where he had spent several months. Addison was a mill operator at Lorane, since 1905. He was born Feb. 12, 1872, at Joliet, Ill., coming to Oregon as a boy. He was married in 1904 at Oakland, Ore., to Madge D. Bishop, who died in 1930.

Addison was active in civic affairs, was a member of the Grange, the Christian church and Odd Fellows lodge, all at Lorane, as well as serving on the school board and with other civic groups.

Surviving him are six sons, Thayne, Hubert, Clifford and Lealand Addison, all of Lorane; Major John Kenneth Addison, U. S. army; Donald Addison, U. S. navy; two daughters, Mrs. Lucille Mitchell of Lorane, Mrs. Dorothy Durbin of Eugene; also the following brothers and sisters: A. H. and B. C. Addison, both of Lorane; A. D. Addison of Eugene; Mrs. Pearl Wentworth and Mrs. Frank Tripp, both of Eugene; Mrs. W. T. Moore and Mrs. Ella Schneider, both of Lorane; Mrs. Almon Moore of Idaho Falls, and Mrs. Leslie Pettibone of Portland.

Funeral services will be held Monday at 2 p. m. from the Poole chapel, Walter J. Fiscus, pastor of the First Christian church officiating. Interment will be in the I. O. O. F. No. 2 cemetery.

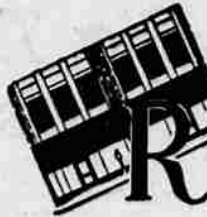
