Emerald All Out For Student Union

Construction of a student union building on the University of Oregon campus as a "must" project immediately at the end of the war was the motif of Saturday's issue of the Oregon Daily Emerald, devoted exclusively to the project.

With 5,000 copies printed, the issue was distributed among the far-flung alumni of the institution, many of whom took an active part in promoting the movement in pre-war days.

Inaugurated 20 years ago, the movement has been set back by the depression and by war. The fund now has \$47,548 in cash, with additional resources and pledges sufficient to assure construction of a building worthy to house the operating, service, and recreational activities of a vastly expanded post-war student body. The 1941 legislature authorized the borrowing of \$350,000 by the student body to finance the project.

Statements promoting the big project were given the Emerald by Donald M. Erb, president of the university; Palmer Hoyt (Oregon '23), domestic director of OWI; and others, including several members of the Oregon faculty and administration.

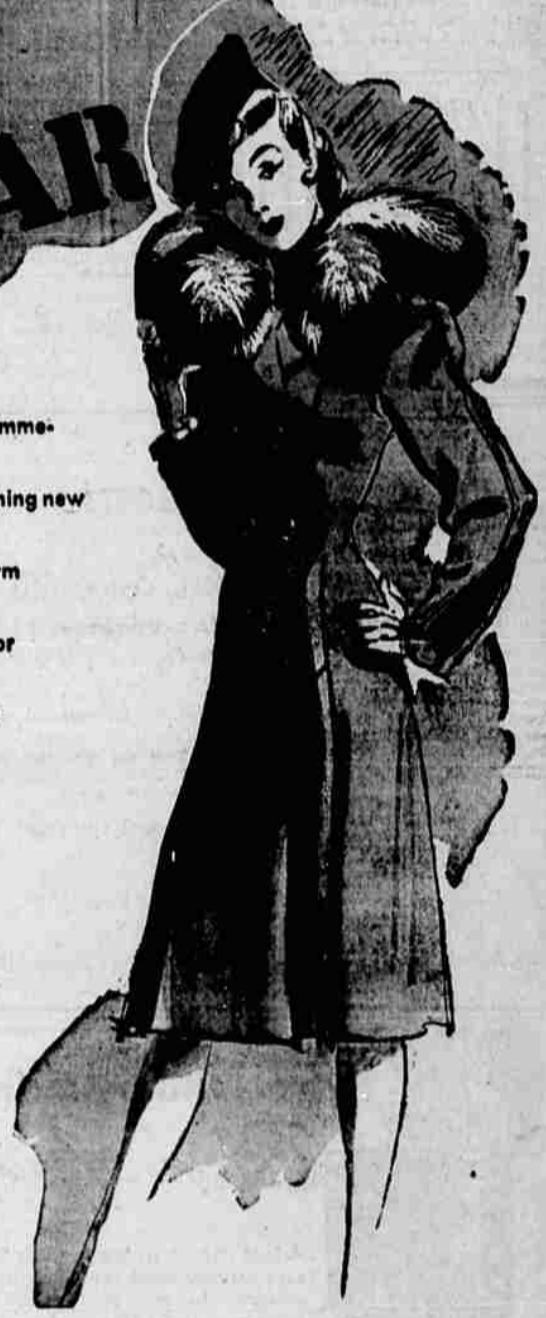
