

Great Lakes Victory Over Notre Dame Is Big Upset

Gridiron Giants Fall in Final Games of Season

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—(AP)—That long delayed wave of upsets that usually marks every college football season struck unexpectedly last week and left in its wake the wreckage of Notre Dame's dreams for a perfect season.

Perhaps even more shocking than last year's 55-12 rout of mighty Boston College by Holy Cross was the sizzling news late Saturday that Great Lakes had completed a 46-yard pass in the last 30 seconds to humble the fighting Irish, 19-14.

Navy's Victory Overlooked

Coming in the last regular week of the 1943 campaign the waves of upsets also bowled over unbeaten and untied Randolph Field of Texas; Franklin-Marshall of Lancaster, Pa.; and almost gave underdog Cornell a victory over Pennsylvania. Virtually overlooked was Navy's 13-0 triumph over Army in the game that was expected to be the outstanding one of the week.

Behind 12-7 Notre Dame had taken a 14-12 lead on Creighton Miller's touchdown with only a minute to play, a touchdown that apparently assured the Irish their tenth straight victory and their unbeaten, untied season since the 1930 Knute Rockne team.

But the Sailors put on a regular movie finish after that. The Irish kicked off to the Sailors 37. Steve Lach completed a pass to the Irish 46. On the next play he faded back while Paul Anderson cut behind the Notre Dame secondary and snared Lach's perfect peg on the seven without a soul near him.

There can be little doubt, however, that the Irish still rank as the No. 1 team in the country on the basis of their victories over Pitt, Georgia Tech, Michigan, Wisconsin, Illinois, Navy, Army, Northwestern and the Seahawks.

Pass Gamble Proves Costly

Navy, aided greatly by Hal Hamburg's coffin-corner punting, shoved over two second-half touchdowns for its fifth straight victory over Army to win the eastern championship. Like the Seahawks, Navy finished its season unbeaten only by Notre Dame. The Seahawks' trounced Minnesota 32-0 in their last game.

Randolph Field went down before Southwestern Louisiana Institute 6-0, while Bucknell defeated F & M 21-13. A coffin-corner punt by Alvin Dark that went out on Randolph one-yard line in the third period paved the way for the SLI score. Glenn Dobbs, star Randolph forward passer, gambled on an aerial from the end zone. Fred Jacob's, reserve SLI half, intercepted it on the 18 and ran for the only touchdown of the game.

Although defeated, Randolph was selected yesterday to oppose Texas in the Cotton Bowl on New Year's Day. Texas won the Southwest conference title by beating the Texas Aggies on Thanksgiving.

Except for the bowl game and a March Field-Del Monte pre-flight game on Dec. 11, the season is over.

Friel Selects W.S.C. Basketball Starters

PULLMAN, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Coach Jack Friel already has his starters picked for the Washington State College basketball team's opening games Dec. 1-2 against Whitman College at Walla Walla.

Waller, 6 feet and four inches tall, moved to the pivot post from forward after Tom Smith transferred back to Eastern Washington College.

'Frozen' Player Contracts Baseball Worry

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—(AP)—As club owners and officials converged upon New York for this week's minor and major league baseball meetings, we learn that Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis is expected to make soon an extremely important "emancipation proclamation."

This proclamation would make free agents of hundreds of minor league players who have gone in to service or defense plants; but who still are bound by the questionable deals of clubs that folded for the duration.

Emancipation would permit these men to make the best contracts possible with any clubs they preferred when they return to the game.

Meanwhile, their plight tossed one of the biggest wartime problems into the laps of Landis and

William G. Bramham, president of the minor leagues, Landis and Bramham received early storm warnings during the recent season when a few players were discharged from service because of physical incapacities. Their old clubs had suspended operations for the duration; and the clubs to whom their contracts had been shifted—in wholesale lots—had no place for them. Where should they go? What was their status? Did baseball law prevent them from negotiating with other clubs?—etc.

This situation results from the folding of many minor leagues since 1940, the peak year when the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues comprised 44 minor circuits of more than 300 member clubs. Last season only nine minor leagues operated.

Achiu had been thrown out of the ring, and Wagner was on the top rope ready to send a kick into LaBelle when Achiu came back to use jiu-jitsu on McEuin, who was holding LaBelle. Just before Wagner jumped, LaBelle ducked, and Wagner landed with full force on McEuin's face. After that McEuin was downed easily and Wagner soon followed. With two falls, LaBelle and Achiu were announced as the winners, and walked away happily while Wagner and McEuin remained in the ring listening to the crowd's boos.

BULLDOGS BEAT BOMBERS
SAN DIEGO, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Seven pass interceptions by the Los Angeles Bulldogs Sunday gave them a 28-17 win over the previously undefeated San Diego Bombers, last year's west coast professional football champions.

Luckman Sets Marks For Bears

Sammy Baugh Trails In Pro Passing Duel

CHICAGO, Nov. 22.—(AP)—From here on the pressure is on the Washington Redskins and their pass-master, Sammy Baugh.

While the Chicago Bears ended their regular National football league season yesterday by smashing the Chicago Cardinals 35-24 to clinch the western division title, the Redskins lost their first league game, to Phil-Pitt, 27-14. Washington thus must win at least one of its final two games, both with the New York Giants, to capture the eastern crown and gain entrance to the National championship playoff against the Bears in Wrigley Field, Dec. 19.

In the meantime, Baugh will have to pass as never before if he wishes to beat Sid Luckman's two-all-time aerial marks set Sunday. The Bears' trigger-man completed 10 passes for 241 yards against the Cardinals, running his gain to 2194, and also hooked up four touchdown tosses, boosting his total to 28.

These accomplishments bettered the two seasonal records posted by Cecil Isbell last year—2021 yards gained and 24 touchdown passes.

Baugh, who picked up only 172 yards in 12 connections against Phil-Pitt, must collect 848 yards in his two remaining games and pitch seven touchdowns to surpass Sid's new records.

Besides the Redskins' game at New York Sunday, Green Bay and Phil-Pitt will close their season tonight at Philadelphia.

Phil-Pitt 27, Washington 14: Bob Thurbon scored twice for the Steagles on short lunge in the first and third quarters, and Ernie Steele's 47-yard dash and Jack Hinkle's one-yard buck after one of Baugh's quick-kicks had been blocked added two more markers in the fourth. Baugh tossed to Bob Masterson and Joe Agirre for Washington's two scores.

Bears, 35, Cardinals 24 — The Bears rallied for three touchdowns in the last period, Bronko Nagurski plunging over for one yard and Luckman slinging 25 yards to Harry Clark and then 10 yards to George Wilson. Nagurski, returning to his old role as full-back after being used as tackle this season, contributed 85 yards on 16 trips with the ball.

New York 24, Brooklyn 7 — Ward Cuff swerved 14 yards to score, booted three extra points and a 37-yard field goal. Bill Paschal added two other Giants touchdowns, going eight yards to top off a 45-yard drive and snatching Tuffy Lee-man's toss on a 24-yard play.

Del Monte, March Field Teams Are Rated Leading Teams in Pacific Coast Football

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Windup of the regular Pacific football season today showed Del Monte pre-flight and the Fourth Air Force Flyers from March Field as the top service teams of the year, with University of Southern California and University of Washington ready to go in the Rose Bowl New Year's Day for collegiate supremacy.

One other outstanding collegiate squad, Amos Alonzo Stagg's College of the Pacific Tigers, will challenge March Field Dec. 11 in Los Angeles, in the only remaining game before the Pasadena classic and Shrine East-West game in San Francisco, January 1.

March Field turned back the San Diego naval training station Sunday for the second time this year, winning 13-2. USC fumbled its way through a daffy game with UCLA to score a 26-13 win Saturday, while Del Monte was crushing California 47-8.

The week-end results left March Field and Del Monte with one defeat each. The fliers lost to undefeated Washington, while Del Monte's all-Americans were upset by College of the Pacific.

Pacific suffered its only loss at the hands of the Trojans, who dropped contests with San Diego navy and March Field this month. The Tars from San Diego lost only two games, both to March Field.

The passing of Indian Jack Jacobs, March Field halfback who annihilated USC two weeks ago with touchdown aerial tosses, brought the fliers their repeat win over San Diego.

In the second quarter, Jacobs looped a long pass to Woodrow Wilson Strode on the Tars' 6-yard line, and followed up with an end zone heave to Hank Norberg. Norberg galloped to the San Diego two with another Jacobs' pass in the fourth, with Sol Rosato crashing over for the second score.

The navy men got on the scoreboard in the third, when Jimmy Nelson fumbled a bad pass from center and was tackled behind his goal line.
