Good progress is being made on the carrot pack at the Eugene Growers association, reports A. McCormack, manager, favorable weather helping out. Carrots are coming in at the plant at the rate of around 250 tons daily. By the end of the week, depending on the weather, the plant should be half through the pack. It is estimated that the cannery will be through with carrots between mid-November and the first of February. Normally, the cannery concludes its packing season by mid-December, but labor shortage, coupled with heavy packs and other factors, extended the canning season this year.

J. Ray Northam and Daisy LaVelle Statzer, both of Eugene, have recently obtained a marriage license at Vancouver, Wash.

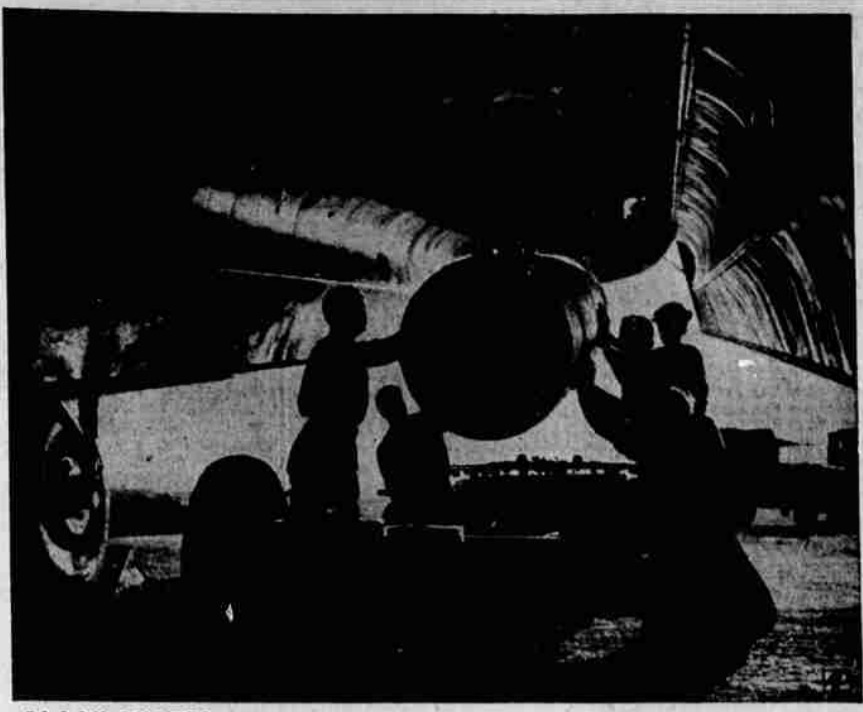
Finley Whipps of Cottage Grove was in Eugene Monday to visit his son, Nelson F. Whipps, deputy sheriff.

Boys to Get Bids To Visit Scouts

Every boy when he becomes 12 years old will receive an invitation to visit a Boy Scout troop according to a plan to be instituted at the scoutmasters' roundtable meeting to be held at 8 p. m. today at the Congregational church. The plan is being initiated here in order to make scouting available to more boys. Local surveys show that only one out of six boys become scouts, although three out of four indicate they want to belong to Boy Scout troops. More than 150 boys in Eugene will receive invitations from local

scout troops during 1944. The plan will also be used in communities in the Lane district of the Wallamet council which have only one troop. Scoutmasters will also discuss troop operation and activities at the meeting and will consider war services in which Boy Scouts are asked to participate.
