## Eugene Bird Census Shows 44 Species

Natural History society of Eugene completed its annual Christmas bird census in the city limits during the past week, sending the result to the national Audubon society in New York city.

Forty-four species of birds were counted, as follows: blue heron, 3; western red-tailed hawk, 1; sparrow hawk, 10; ring-necked pheasant, 6; killdeer, 17; mourning dove, 1; northwestern flicker, 42; downy woodpecker, 4; coast jay, 2; crow, 90; Oregon chickadee, 40; chestnut backed chickadee, 7; nuthatch, 12; Seattle wren, 3; robin, 300; western bluebird, 18; golden-crowned kinglet, 12; Audubon's warbler, 18; meadowlark, 15; Brewer's blackbird, 300; California purple finch, 3; Oregon towhee, 7; junco, 500; golden-crowned sparrow, 17; fox sparrow, 2; rusty song-sparrow, 20; white-crowned sparrow, 35; English sparrow, 250; Savannah sparrow, 12; gull, 8; Merganser duck, 6; mallard, 35; coot, 50; scaup duck, 50; grebe, 2; raven, 1; short-eared owl, 1.
