COLLEGE GETS RARE BOOK

DURHAM, N. H. (U.P.)—An edition of Diophantus' "Arithmetic," believed to be the only one in the United States, has been presented to the University of New Hampshire by Dean Herman L. Slobin of the university's graduate school. The "Arithmetic," written in Latin and Greek, was published in 1821 and is a fine example of the book-making of that period. Its author also wrote the earliest known work on algebra.
