SEATTLE, Jan. 3.—(AP)—A proposal asking the OPA to reduce value of "A" gasoline ration coupons from three to two gallons as a means of combating an acute gasoline shortage will be acted on by the board of directors of the Washington Gasoline Dealers' association tomorrow.

Oregon Flier Helps Initiate New Field

WITH U. S. FORCES ON BOUGAINVILLE, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Lt. Victor L. Morton, Redmond, Ore., was one of the United States pilots making initial landings on a 6500 foot field for light and medium bombers, which was placed in operation yesterday within less than 250 miles of Rabaul and only 850 miles from Japan's mighty naval base of Truk.

The airfield at the base of the fuming volcano, Mount Bagana, was carved out of the heaviest of jungles and was dedicated Christmas day. It is the second field to be established on the expanding United States beachhead which marines won Nov. 1 with a landing at Empress Augusta bay on Bougainville's west central coast.

Amos F. Ellmaker, 91, Eugene Pioneer, Dies

ELMIRA—Amos F. Ellmaker, 91, died Sunday evening at the home of his nephew, Ulysses W. Ellmaker, Crow Stage route. He was born at Libertyville, Iowa, Aug. 2, 1852, and soon afterward crossed the plains with his parents by ox team, locating at Chesire, Ore. In 1857 the Ellmakers moved to the present Ulysses Ellmaker home and Amos Ellmaker had made his home in that same place for 86 years.

In addition to the nephew with whom he lived, he is survived by several other nieces and nephews. He was a charter member of the Elmira Christian church.

Comptroller Issues Bank Statement Call

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—The comptroller of the currency today issued a call for a statement of the condition of all national banks at the close of business Friday, December 31, 1943.

The federal reserve board at the same time issued a call on state banks that are members of the federal reserve system, and the Federal Deposit Insurance corporation a call on insured banks not members of the federal reserve system.

Pork Buyers Get Five-Point Bonus

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Pork-eaters received a new war-ration bonus today from the OPA. OPA ruled that spare stamp No. 2 on No. 4 ration book is good for the purchase of five points worth of fresh pork and sausage until Jan 15. The stamp will not be good for buying smoked or cured pork.

The new stamp replaces, in point purchasing power, the old No. 1 spare stamp, which was good for five points in pork buying until yesterday.

OPA said validation of the new stamp was made necessary because of the larger number of hogs sent to market.

Holiday Has Two Deaths in Traffic

By The Associated Press Oregon, which went through the Christmas holidays with no violent deaths, recorded two over the New Year's weekend.

The victims were Wilma Green, Corvallis, and Sherwood Faught, a soldier from Raleigh, Tenn. They were killed in an automobile which hurtled through the air and sheared a power pole after being struck by a south-bound Southern Pacific passenger train at the outskirts of Albany Saturday.

Mrs. Lela Green, mother of the dead woman, was injured seriously.

Firemen Beaten

ASTORIA, Ore., Jan. 3.—Coast guardsmen, who beat the volunteer fire department to a blaze in Westport school teacherage, were credited today with saving the school building and new gymnasium.

Aged Man Held In Hotel Death

PORTLAND, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Hiram L. Duvall, 71, today was held in jail here in the death of a fellow hotel roomer who was beaten with a heavy cane after he apparently tried to enter on the floor below his own by mistake.

Michael Abranoff, 49, died at a hospital last night after the beating administered before dawn New Year's day.

As police reconstructed the affair, Duvall was awakened about 4:15 a. m. by someone fumbling at his door with a key. His warnings unheeded, the aged man picked up his cane—of steel tubing and wood weighted with lead—opened the door and beat Abranoff on the head and shoulders.
