

## Two Cash Gifts Made to University

Two more gifts to the University of Oregon have just been announced from the office of Dr. Earl M. Pallett, executive secretary. One of these is for \$1000 from the estate of Mrs. Flora Campbell MacDonald, late of Eugene, and the other for \$200 from the estate of Mrs. Amy R. Goldsmith, late of Portland.

In a letter written to President Erb, Dr. Ian Campbell (Oregon '22), professor of geology at California Institute of Technology, announced the gift of a \$1000 U. S. treasury bond from his deceased aunt, Mrs. MacDonald, made in her will, in which she made Dr. Campbell and his sister, Mrs. Flora Campbell (Mrs. George H. Houck '23) of Los Angeles, residual heirs. The gift, he explained, is without limitations but suggested its use in purchasing books and/or

journals for the library. Mrs. Goldsmith's gift, transmitted by her husband, Arthur A. Goldsmith of Portland, executor of her will, is a check for \$200 for unrestricted use. Mrs. Goldsmith, who attended the university for two years and finished at Wellesley, designated \$800 to be divided among four institutions—Oregon, Wellesley, Reed, and Stanford, "which I, my husband, or my sons have attended."

## Ernest Haycox to Be Dad's Day Speaker

Ernest Haycox, Portland, well-known novelist and Oregon alumnus, will address Oregon Dads and their sons and daughters at the University of Oregon's annual Dad's day celebration January 22, it is announced by Robert Hemphill, Portland, general chairman. Haycox will speak at the Dad's day luncheon at 1:30 Saturday afternoon on the subject, "Dads Belong to the Human Race."

Other highlights of the weekend are the Oregon-Washington basketball game Saturday evening in McArthur court and a special showing of "Dark Victory," university theater production directed by Horace Robinson, acting head of the drama department.

A new feature of this year's Dad's week-end is that invitations are being sent to fathers of all soldier-students at the university who live in the Pacific Coast states, according to Karl W. Onthank, secretary of the Oregon Dad's organization and dean of personnel administration at the university.

## Phyllis Foster Fair Group Guest

Phyllis Foster, Cottage Grove high school student, who late in November attended the national 4-H club congress meeting in Chicago, as a reward for winning the highest honors in the state in home beautification work, will be a guest of the Oregon State Fair association at a luncheon at the Imperial hotel in Portland Saturday of this week.

The several other Oregon 4-H club members who were sent to Chicago on account of their outstanding club work, will also attend the luncheon. E. A. Danielson, Lane county club leader, will accompany Miss Foster.

## Rebuilding of Bridges Planned

The two low bridges on the Coburg highway a short distance south of the bridge over the McKenzie river will be rebuilt as soon as the lumber can be obtained. It was announced by County Judge Clinton Hurd Wednesday. Arthur Striker, county bridge superintendent, will direct construction.

One of the bridges is 247 feet long and the other, 133 feet. Both were built in 1927, when Judge Hurd was county commissioner. Some of the timbers are beginning to rot and it was deemed best to rebuild before some of them give way. The entire superstructure of both spans will be replaced but the old piling will be used.

It may be some time before the work is started because of the difficulty of obtaining immediate delivery of lumber.

## Road Established By County Court

One new road was ordered established, a gateway was ordered vacated and a short road was vacated at the monthly road meeting of the county court Wednesday.

A road three-quarters of a mile long, following the route of a private lane from the McKenzie highway a mile and a half above Waltherville to the Couch farm was established, provided the owners of the property will furnish the right of way.

Upon petition of Dr. E. D. Furrer of Eugene the Cora Ferguson gateway a short distance west of Creswell was ordered vacated and upon petition of Ralph Nichols part of a road and plat of Nicholas Gardens east of Springfield was vacated.

A petition asking the establishment of a new road leading to the Hugh H. Earle farm near the store at Blachly was presented but no action was taken because it was not in proper form.

## Army Air Force Wants 17-year-olds

Seventeen-year-old men with the ambition of becoming flying officers are urged by Major B. P. Cody, district recruiting officer, to support the army air forces intensive procurement campaign designed to enroll men for aviation cadet training as pilots, navigators, and bombardiers.

Tremendously increased plane production and increased offensive activity, explains Major Cody, have created many new openings in the air corps for air crew training. The object of the 17-year-old recruiting drive is to insure the fulfillment of future quotas in the enlarged air force training program for aviation cadets. Enrollees are not called for training until after their 18th birthdays.

The 14-month air crew training course entails approximately a \$35,000 expenditure by the government on each cadet. Prior to actual flight instruction the men are given five months of pre-flight training at one of America's leading colleges or universities.

Physically fit and mentally alert 17-year-olds may obtain complete information about signing in the air corps enlisted reserve by calling on the civil air patrol representative at the army recruiting office, located at 10 post office building, Eugene.

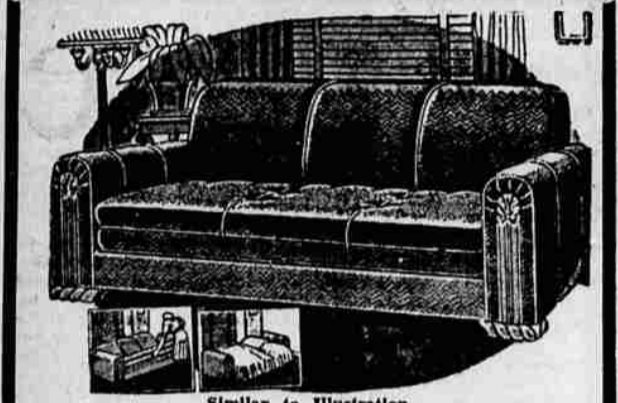

## OWI Dashes Peace Hopes

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6—(AP)—Though much blood already has been spilled, the brutal fact is that the United Nations thus far have liberated only a fourth of the territory overrun by the nazis and a twentieth of the land seized by Japan, the OWI said today in warning against hopes for an early end of the war.

The OWI, in a long report clearly aimed at offsetting overoptimism, said high military leaders believed that much heavy fighting was necessary to crush Germany and that there was no soft, easy way to conquering Japan.
