Gas Ration Slash Foreseen for Coast

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6. — (U.P.) — Expiration of No. 9 "A" gasoline ration coupons on January 21 and a possible cut in their value within the next 30 days is expected to cause more trouble with civilian drivers in the five western states.

Gasoline stations, many of which have not yet recovered from the year-end crisis caused by premature exhaustion of December fuel quotas, expected heavy runs as motorists attempted to get a full three gallons' worth from each coupon.

Leon Gentner, regional OPA administrator, warned the OPA "has every reason to believe" that value of "A" coupons may have to be reduced owing to increasing shipments of petroleum products to the Pacific war fronts.

A priority system for the five western states is now under preparation, the petroleum administrator for war announced. The plan would assure truckers, war workers and essential drivers adequate gasoline supplies before civilian needs are met.

Seattle Flier Killed In Utah Crash

WENDOVER, Utah, Jan. 6. — (U.P.) — Lt. Hugh Ashby of Seattle was one of six airmen killed when a four-engine plane crashed late Monday 65 miles east of Wendover, the air base public relations office said last night.

Lt. Ashby, whose mother, Mrs. C. Q. Ashby, lives in Seattle, was born at Sprague, Wash., but moved to Seattle at an early age.

He served as a flight instructor and flight commander at the Moses Lake, Wash., air base and recently had been ferrying Boeing Flying Fortresses to various parts of the country.

Five members of the crew, including Staff Sgt. Ernest E. Hunt of Stayton, Ore., parachuted to safety.

Albany and Tillamook Housing Approved

PORTLAND — (U.P.) — The national housing agency has approved housing projects in Albany and Tillamook.

Fred C. Cuthbert, senior representative here, said the Albany project will include 60 units, 30 through new private construction, 25 through public conversion and five through private conversion.

Public funds will be used to construct 20 family units at Tillamook and private sources 15.

Inquiry Over OPA Token Policy Planned

CHICAGO, Jan. 6. — (U.P.) — Rep. Fred E. Busbey (R-Ill.) said tonight he would demand a congressional investigation into the OPA's "public and industry be damned" attitude in the manufacture of \$3,000,000 worth of ration tokens.

"Turning loose these tokens, all smaller than a dime," Busbey said, "will result in untold hardship and confusion to the public and fraud and financial loss to American industry."
