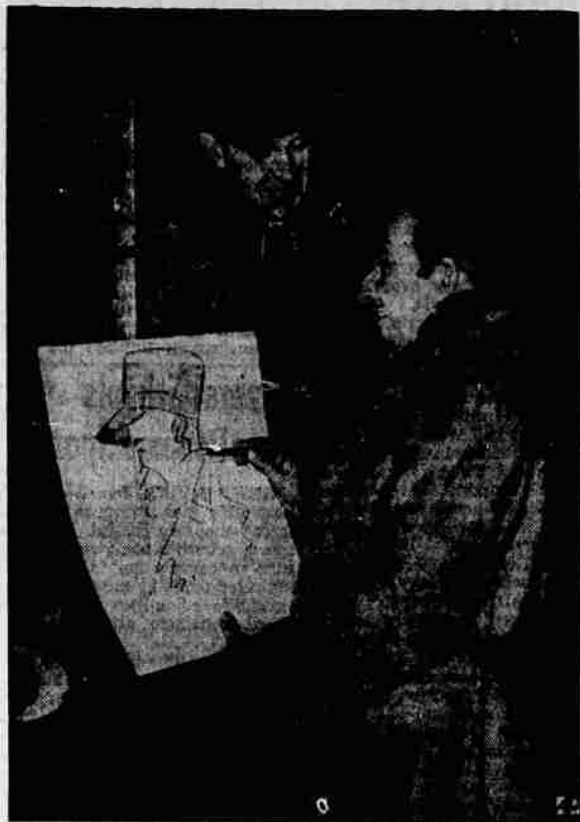

May Crick and Marie Hansen, OSC students, are spending the winter vacation at their respective homes.

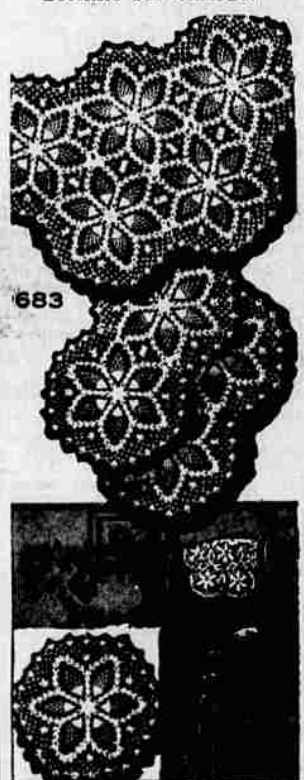
IN CALIFORNIA

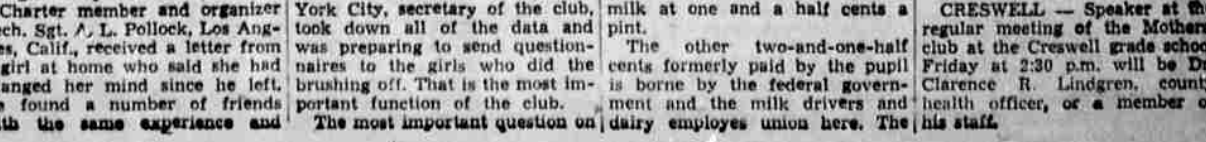

ASTORIA—(P)—Clatsop county grade school children are getting milk at one and a half cents a pint.

The other two-and-one-half cents formerly paid by the pupil is borne by the federal government and the milk drivers and dairy employees union here. The union's share comes from money raised in the annual milk fund jamboree.

Free milk will be given as before in cases determined by county health nurses.
