Survivor Describes Liscome Bay Sinking

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 8.—(AP)—The escort aircraft carrier Liscome Bay was so full of holes when she went down off the Gilbert Islands after an enemy torpedo attack that she went under without any suction.

So chief quartermaster P. W. Raitran, who was swimming in the water only a few feet away when she made her final plunge, told workers recently at the Henry J. Kaiser yard here, where the ship was built.

Raitran, who survived the sinking by swimming around and under flaming patches of oil that dotted the sea, said the ship was rocked by three blasts. The third, he said, may have been ammunition exploding.

Mrs. Hoover Remembered As Famous Husband's Companion

NEW YORK, Jan. 8. — (AP)— Mrs. Herbert Hoover, wife of the former president and his life-long help-met, died suddenly Friday of heart disease. Mr. Hoover was with her when she was stricken.

The former Lou Henry, Mrs. Hoover remained in the background during her husband's career. Her chief public interest was the Girl Scouts.

The Hoovers were students together at Leland Stanford university and were married in 1899, when the young engineer was commissioned an adviser on mining to the Chinese government.

They spent their honeymoon in China, the first of many trips to far places which Mr. Hoover's engineering career entailed.

While her husband was president, Mrs. Hoover made a dignified, white-haired chaperone of the White House. The public knew little of her, other than her Girl Scout activities. But she was her husband's intellectual help-met, aiding him in translating from the medieval Latin Agricola's "De re Metallica."

The Hoovers have lived quietly since they left the White House, alternating between their home at Palo Alto, Cal., on the Stanford University campus, and their apartment here. They have two sons, Herbert, Jr., and Allan.

Details of the death were not immediately available. A brief statement, given out from the Hoover apartment in the Waldorf Towers, said merely that Mrs. Hoover had died unexpectedly of heart disease, that the former president was with her, and

Returning to Find Wife Re-wed, Amnesia Victim Goes His Way

PORTLAND, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Allen E. Miller, who came back home after seven years to find his wife married to another man, bowed out of the triangle Thursday.

Miller, missing from home since a month before his daughter was born in November, 1938, told police Capt. James Fleming he apparently was a victim of amnesia. He said he remembered nothing before 1937 when he was in Texas.

Miller said he recently discovered papers indicating he had a wife and child here so he returned to investigate. He said he did not recognize his wife, now Mrs. M. E. Atkinson, when police arranged a meeting yesterday.

Mrs. Atkinson said she had been informed in 1937 that Miller was injured fatally in an automobile accident in Texas.

Miller told reporters, "I'll withdraw—after all, she's happily married now," but he insisted he should contribute to the support of their child.

Messages of condolence began coming in as soon as news of the death became known. Many prominent persons called to offer the condolences.

Mrs. Hoover was born in Waterloo, Ia., daughter of Charles D. and Florence Weed Henry and was graduated, A.B. from Stanford on Feb. 10 of the following year.

Indicative of her retiring nature, Mrs. Hoover gives only nine lines to her biography, mentioning her work as a translator and the fact that she was "a member, officer and honorary officer of many educational and philanthropic organizations."

Treasury Taxing Power Assailed

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Rep. Harold Knutson (R-Minn.) assailed Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., recently for allegedly usurping legislative powers and said he would sponsor a bill to divorce the tax-collecting internal revenue bureau from the treasury.

Ranking minority member of the house ways and means committee, he asserted that many congressmen of both parties are "at the end of their patience in reference to the attempt of Secretary Morgenthau to usurp the constitutional control of the legislative branch over the policy."

Morgenthau has failed to recognize, he added, that the constitution vests tax-originating power exclusively in the house and that the treasury has no authority or right to submit revenue proposals except at the invitation of congress.

Knutson will propose to the ways and means group that the internal revenue bureau be made an independent agency.

He told reporters he thought "Morgenthau would rather lose his teeth than the internal revenue bureau."

Morgenthau recently castigated congress for what he termed the inadequacy of the pending \$2,275,000,000 tax bill and said its liberal amendments to the war contract renegotiation law would permit exorbitant industrial profits and open the way to a national scandal.

Bouncing Betty Endangers Yanks

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Bouncing Betty haunts the hills and roads leading to Rome and is public enemy number 1 of the American doughboy.
