Farm Project Committees Meet

Two project committees of the
Lane county agricultural council
held their 1944 planning meetings
Tuesday the crop improvement
committee meeting in the fore-
noon and the soil improvement
committee in the afternoon.

E. R. Jackman, extension crop
specialist at the state college, as-
sisted the crop improvement com-
mittee in its planning and Arthur
King, extension soil specialist at
the college, met with the soil im-
provement committee. O. S.
Fletcher, county agent, assisted
both committees.

The crop committee planned its
work under six different head-
ings: 1, seed improvement; 2, for-
age crops; 3, cereals; 4, potatoes;
5, weed control; 6, miscellaneous.
Under the head of seed grow-
ing, the committee in general
recommended growing seed of
some scarce crop, especially sub-
terranean clover, and recom-
mended carrying on a seed cer-
tification program and fertilizer
trials. The importance of farm-
ers growing high protein feeds as
forage crops was stressed and it
was decided to help them locate
good potato seed and to promote
control of insects.

On account of farm labor short-
age, it was brought out, there is
a tendency to let weeds go to seed
and the committee urged a weed
control program.

Every member of the committee
was present. They are Max Niel-
sen, Junction City RFD 3; Wil-
liam James, Eugene RFD 2; Ray-
mond A. Johnson, Eugene RFD
1; C. B. Flanagan, Junction City
RFD 2, and John C. A. Williams,
Eugene RFD 5.

The soil improvement com-
mittee discussed irrigation, drainage
and soil fertility. The farmers
will be urged by the committee,
on account of the shortage of ir-
rigation equipment, to use all such
equipment to the fullest extent.
While there will be no irrigation
tours this year, there will be
meetings where farmers may dis-
cuss their irrigation problems.

Soybean Meal Seen For Oregon Producers

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 12.—(U.P.)
—Leon S. Jackson of Portland,
secretary of the Oregon Seed and
Feed dealers, said today state live-
stock, dairy and poultry producers
would be granted 2000 tons of soy-
bean meal to replenish their re-
cord low stocks.

About 1200 tons of the soybean
meal scheduled for delivery in
Oregon was ordered by the state
AAA committee from oilseed
crushers who were required to set
aside 20 per cent of their Janu-
ary output for distribution in de-
ficit areas, he said.

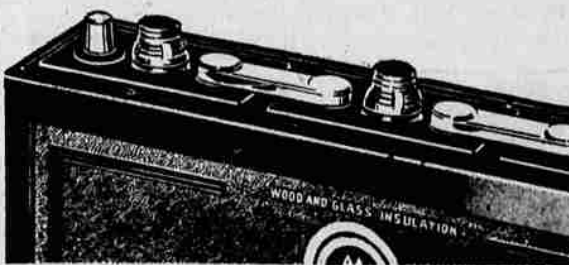

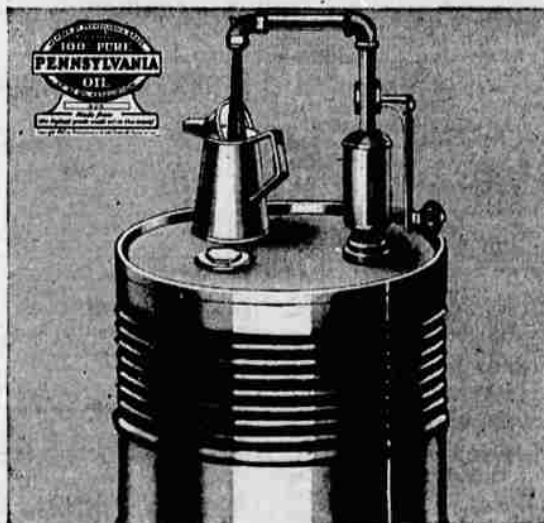
