Youths Respond to Navy Radio Offer

Response to the navy's new program to train 17-year-olds in radio materiel has been extremely gratifying in this district, it is reported by Chief W. E. Bell, in charge of the Eugene naval recruiting station.

The most popular feature of the program is that a 17-year-old student who is qualified to become a radio technician applicant, if he is in his final term, may be enlisted now and placed on inactive duty until he is graduated.

Those who pass a qualifying examination are immediately rated as seamen first class, comparable to corporal in the army.

This training, the recruiter points out, is equivalent to three years of college training in radio and sound engineering.

Students interested in obtaining all the details of this opportunity are invited to consult the recruiter. Parents are welcome to accompany their sons.

The natives of New Guinea are friendly people, trustworthy, and very helpful to the allies, according to Capt. Delmar Newman, who is back from that far area to recuperate from wounds.

These people of New Guinea hate the Japanese, because the Japs robbed their gardens, took all their food, cut down their coconut trees, recruited the men for labor without pay, gave them beatings if they did not work, and stole the women from that section, Newman said.

The captain spent some time describing the terrain of New Guinea, its climate, its products and resources, its transportation, the power situation, the characteristics of the people, and other interesting things about that section.
