**Clear Sailing for FDR
Seen in State Primaries**

PORTLAND, Jan. 14.—(AP)—
President Roosevelt will be unop-
posed for renomination on the
democratic ballot in the Oregon
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Lew Wallace.

Wallace, who announced yester-
day he would be a candidate for
democratic national committeeman
from Oregon, said he believes the
state delegation to the party's na-
tional convention will be pledged
for Roosevelt.

Uniform Freight
Rate Plan Opposed

Political rate-making is a
threat to the west, Dr. Calvin
Crumbaker, professor of econom-
ics at University of Oregon, de-
clares in the current issue of the
Oregon Business Review. Legis-
lation to make freight rates more
uniform is now being urged by
certain southern interests, he
says.

"Producers, shipper, carrier,
and consumer interests in the
west should be on the alert to
guard against the proposal to
make political rates. Such rates
will tend to be the product of
compromise, expediency, and
pressure. The establishment of
rate making by political pressure
would ring the death knell of de-
velopment for areas which rely
on rate making based on the two

principles heretofore recognized—
rates to make the traffic move
freely, and rates to make ade-
quate railroad service possible."

Uniform freight rates would be
disastrous for producers and ship-
pers of west coast oranges, apples,
garden vegetables, wheat, cattle,
sheep, and lumber, as such rates
would make it financially im-
practicable for them to compete

in the eastern markets, he pointed
out.
