Newport.

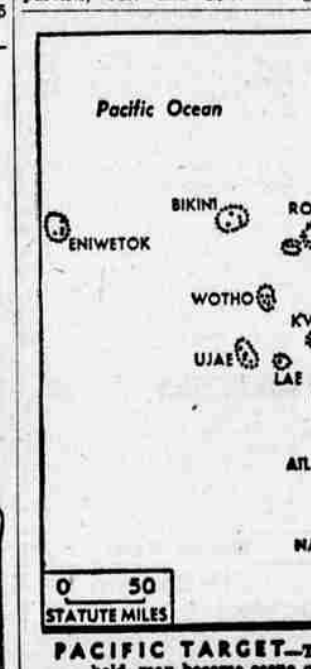
Word has reached here that

Thursday evening.

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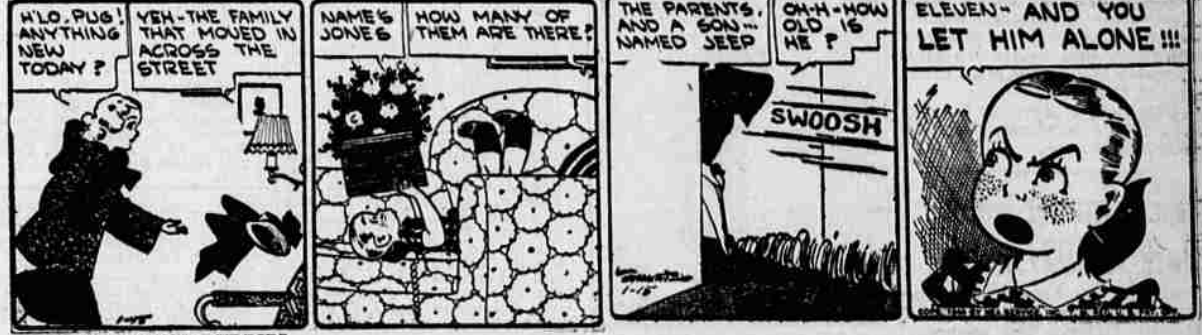

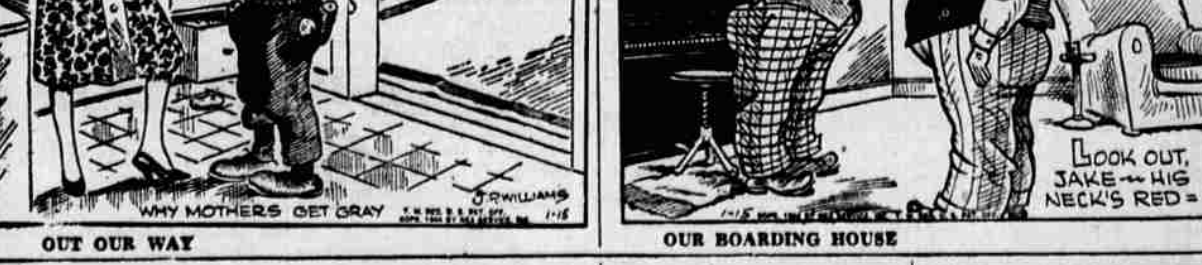
