Marine League's Program Monday

The program to re-name the Lane county detachment of the Marine Corps league as the Gerald Duval Harbert detachment will be held Monday, 8 p.m., Central Presbyterian church. The new name honors a 19-year-old Eugene paramarine who lost his life in the south Pacific in the late fall.

The dedication service is open to all marines and their families and the general public interested.

Stuart Hurd, local commandant, is to preside. E. J. Robb, Portland, state commandant of the league, will give the dedication address, and Rev. Walter J. Ficus, First Christian church, will give the memorial address.

Farm-Buying Loan Plan Explained

Five farms in Lane county can be purchased between now and July 1 by tenants and experienced farm labor families under provisions of the farm ownership program, Mrs. Genevieve Nettleton, Lane county farm security supervisor, announced Saturday. Funds are available for five long-time farm purchase loans, if family-type units can be found at reasonable prices and qualified applicants present themselves, she explained.

"Every successful tenant or farm labor family, preferably with enough livestock and machinery to take over a farm, is eligible to apply for one of the farm ownership loans. The loans are made on the basis of a 40-year variable repayment plan with interest at three per cent. Although funds are limited to \$7991 per individual farm purchase, every step toward more farm ownership by resident operators will benefit farming in this community," said Mrs. Nettleton. "Owners of family-type farms are not only providing the more stable increases in war food production, but are making the most efficient use of their land."

As rapidly as applications are filed they are reviewed by the county FSA committee, farms intended for purchase are appraised and final recommendations as to successful applicants are made. Applicants not selected for the present five loans will be given full consideration for new farm ownership loans expected to be authorized after July 1, 1944.

Landowners and farmers with family-type diversified farms for sale at reasonable prices are invited to list them with this office or county FSA committeemen so they can be considered for the farm ownership program, Mrs. Nettleton advised. Applicants also are asked to have farms for purchase in mind whenever possible.

February Relief Placed at \$44,000

An even \$44,000 is the estimated amount needed in February for public assistance in Lane county, it is revealed in the formal application for county and federal funds, filed by the Lane county public welfare commission.

For general assistance purposes the estimate is \$8000, divided between 105 families, of which 90 are residents and 15 non-resident, and 145 single persons, 135 of whom are residents and 10 non-resident, a total of 225 resident and 25 non-resident cases.

The old age assistance fund is placed at \$28,000, taking care of an estimated 1000 cases; aid to dependent children, \$2900, caring for 50 cases; blind assistance, 14 cases, \$500; administration costs \$3500; soldiers' and sailors' aid, \$300, and county farm, \$800.

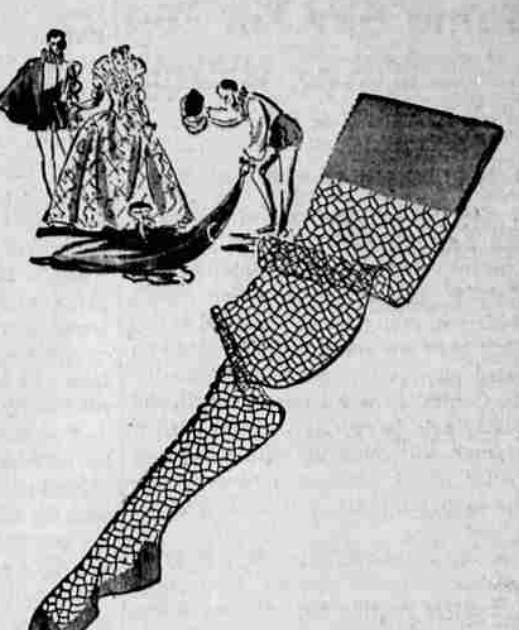

State Vehicle Money Received by County

Lane county Saturday received from the secretary of state at Salem a check for \$21,384.20, which is this county's share of a distribution of \$111,568 allotted to the several counties as state motor vehicle fees and fuel taxes.

The total apportionment to this county for the year 1943 was \$158,652, which included a distribution made in July, one in December and the one made on Friday of this week.

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
