bor council and C. V. McDonald, manager of the U. S. employment service estimated.

Neither men expect trouble in hiring that many laborers but some concern was expressed over the housing situation in Eugene which is acute. McDonald, however pointed out, that many construction workers are single and if these are recruited they could be easily absorbed within existing housing vacancies. However, if families came into the area they probably could not be accommodated, he said.

There is a possibility that after the plant is established, women may be employed in certain processes. The plant will put out small pre-fabricated constructions and it was pointed out by company officials that women could handle many of the operations. Approximately 75 people will be employed permanently at the plant, it was estimated.

Henry Bettis\* from the Portland office of Timber Structures Inc. is expected to arrive in Eugene Wednesday. Bettis will supervise construction of the plant and will have charge of plant operations which will start immediately work on a government contract for 300 small barrack huts for the U. S. army.

W. B. Gard, chairman of the chamber of commerce industries committee, stated Monday that Eugene was very happy to get this type of plant which manufactures local products. It is just the type of industry which Eugene needs, he said, and he hopes that 1944 sees more industries of this type coming into the community.
