Gregor Piatigorsky, famed as the greatest of contemporary 'cellists, hopes that some day he will be known to the world as an author as well as a musician. For several years the great Russian 'cellist, who will play in McArthur court Wednesday night, has devoted most of his free time to writing a book of practical advice for young musicians.

Piatigorsky has lived an adventurous life. He saw the Bolshevik revolution in his native Russia and suffered greatly during the lean years when the Soviet government was still struggling to establish an ordered and peaceful prosperity. He lived in Germany during the years of anarchy and inflation that were the historical background for the rise of Hitler. His concert tours have taken him to all parts of Europe and America.

### Returned Seaman Hits Home Attitude

SPRINGFIELD — "The thing that makes the morale of the ship's company go very low is to read in the papers about the people of the United States going on strikes," declares young Malcolm McChesney, signalman 2-c, just returned from sea duty to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. C. McChesney of Springfield.

Young McChesney went on to say that it really made the men on the fighting front "sore" to find that so many of the people here at home were "sitting back on their dead neck," missing perhaps a couple of pounds of butter, due to rationing, when out there the troops only get turkey once, on Thanksgiving.

"The people in the United States don't know there is a war on. They should meet and talk to some of the men in Australia and places like that to really find out there is such a thing as war!" said he.

All of these were the heartfelt thoughts of a young seaman who is at home for the first time since leaving June 9, 1941, and has taken part in all of the major naval engagements of the Pacific except one, the Coral sea battle.

For his work in the service young McChesney wears on his blouse eight stars and three campaign ribbons. He has seen battles at Midway, Santa Cruz, "where the Hornet went down," Guadalcanal, and Florida island. "We were snipe hunting there. From there we took the slot run," a term used for the Tokyo Express. "To Rendova where the McCauley was hit, then we entered the second battle of Kolombangara. Come November 1, we were at it again and at Bougainville."

"Perhaps the most sentimental thing that happened was at the time that I left my gang. This was because I didn't know if they were going up again or down again, whether they were heading for pleasure or what."

It is "swell" to be home, was the sailor's answer to how it felt to be there, and the parents also made known that it was pretty much all right to have him there, too!

Another brother, Arthur, of the naval air force, is also visiting his parents. He has been stationed in Florida.

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his wife also lives in Eugene. Large was on the staff of the United States National bank of Portland, Eugene branch, before going into the service.

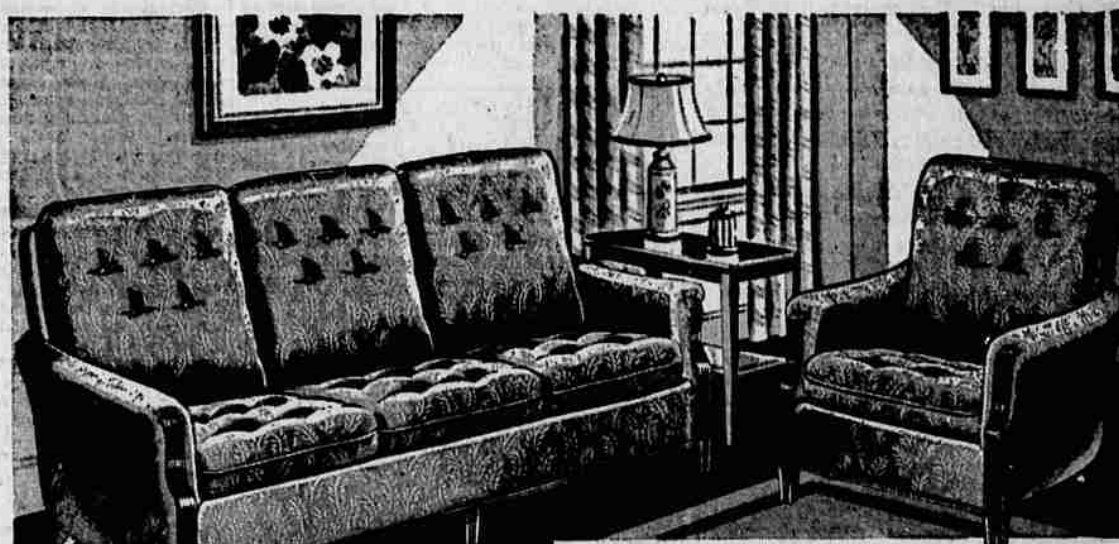
