Nikolai F. Vatutin's 1st army pushed to within 15 miles of the German administrative center of Rovno with the aid of Goeha, 18 miles in the old Polish border, where the 1st Polish infantry was sent.

Forces simultaneously moved from the Soviet Gulf of beachhead around Oranienburg, 13 miles west of Berlin, and breached deeply-etched defenses to seize the former summer home of the four miles east of Oranienburg, and Kipen and Kozher, some 16 miles southeast and west respectively of Oranienburg.

Heavy Rabaul Raid Costs 12 Planes

ADVANCED ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, NEW GUINEA, Jan. 20.—(U.P.)—American planes, intensifying attempts to strangle transportation supplying Rabaul, New Britain, pounded that southern hub of Japanese southwest Pacific defenses with one of its most devastating raids, but U. S. losses were among the highest ever received over the area, it was announced today.

More than 100 torpedo planes, divebombers, and fighters from Solomon bases blasted eight Japanese ships at Simpson harbor Monday, shooting down 18 enemy planes and probably 15 others of the intercepting force of more than 100 planes thrown into the air by the enemy, a communique said. Twelve American planes were shot down.

Britons Warned On Peace Rumors

LONDON, Jan. 20.—(U.P.)—Britons were warned today to be on guard against a wave of insidious peace-talk propaganda inspired by the Germans as rumors printed earlier in the week by Pravda continued to have repercussions in both London and Moscow.

The warning, voiced by the London press, coincided with a similar admonition by the Moscow magazine "War and the Working Class," which called for cleansing of the political atmosphere from "poisonous gases" spread by the nazis in an effort to split the allies.

The soviet publication declared that recent Moscow and Tehran conferences had foredoomed German attempts to sow disunion, but added that "the peoples of the countries allied with us and their responsible leaders must understand the efforts being made by nazi elements."

LONDON, Jan. 20.—(U.P.)—A Swiss report said today that Baron Franz Von Papen, German ambassador to Turkey, has been ordered to negotiate a separate peace with Russia.

you can build for that price," McCuen said. "It doesn't want a 'pee-wee' car. We know that. The cost of labor, materials, distribution and selling is much too high to enable anyone to build a good automobile for \$400. Anyway, we think the used car fills any consumer demand for a \$400 car, and it gives him a better automobile, too."

As far as GM is concerned, he added, all of its facilities are geared for quick resumption of production on 1942 model cars—with only "minor changes."

"We have decided," McCuen said, "that nothing is going to stand in the way of getting back into production at the earliest possible moment after we get authorization. We have surveyed the problem from every possible angle. If the war should end at noon today every key executive in GM knows his job on the passenger car program. The paper work is behind us. We could be functioning on automobiles within an hour."

McCuen said there are "no serious problems" to quick reconversion of GM's enormous facilities, now turning out war materials at a rate exceeding \$12,500,000 daily.
