Judgment Against AP Will Be Appealed

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—(AP)—The federal court judgment in the government's civil anti-trust suit against the Associated Press, non-profit news cooperative, will be appealed to the United States supreme court.

The association's board of directors announced the step Wednesday, declaring in a statement that "no newspaper, no press service can operate successfully under a court injunction."

The judgment, which would restrain the AP perpetually from observing by-laws under which members might consider the competitive ability of an applicant for membership, already is under temporary stay. The appeal, to be taken "without delay," will stay it pending the highest court's ruling.

Hero of Air Battle Hailed by Mates

LONDON, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Major James H. Howard of St. Louis, a former Flying Tiger who out-fought 30 Nazi fighters in a flaming half-hour over Oeschersleben last Tuesday to protect a formation of Flying Fortresses, was hailed by his Mustang pilot-mates today as a "one-man airforce," but he merely said facetiously, "I just seen what looked like my duty and I done it."

The 30-year-old, six-foot-four Missourian was credited officially with two Nazi planes destroyed, two probables and one damaged in reports compiled after the raid, but bombers crews insisted they had seen the lone American fighter shoot down six enemy aircraft.

Reds Have Answer To Hitler Problem

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Russians are providing the answer to what should be done with the "apes that started this war," Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., said here.

In a four network broadcast opening the \$14,000,000,000 fourth war loan, he said this government is determined that axis surrender will be complete and unconditional and "we're going to be sure this time that the enemy lays down its ideas as well as its arms."

He served as narrator in the radio dramatization, "Let's All Back the Attack," which included messages from Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Adm. Chester Nimitz. Others participating were Capt. Ronald Reagan, Bing Crosby, Ginny Simms, John Charles Thomas, Capt. Glenn Miller and his army air force band, and David Broekman and the treasury orchestra.

Appealing for a strong home front to support the battlefield, Morgenthau said that "when everybody makes winning the war the most important single thing in their lives—as it is to the Russians, the Yugoslav patriots and the Chinese—then the war will be all over but the shooting."

While concentrating on planning and perfecting better weapons to win the war, he said, the government is also concentrating on the "second bill of rights" to assure the futures of the fighting men after the war is over. The quickest way into a future of security and prosperity is to concentrate now on getting the job over, he said.

An outstanding feature of the broadcast was a "plane to earth" message in which the pilot of a jet-propelled plane told how it felt to fly one.

Argentina Haven For Hitler Reported

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—A published report that a haven had been prepared in Argentina for Adolf Hitler brought from Secretary of State Hull today a statement that this and other rumors of pro-axis activities in the western hemisphere might be dealt with by the state department when this nation decides whether to recognize the new Bolivian government.

Until then, he said at a news conference, he would not discuss such reports.

ACE PILOT KILLED

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Algiers, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Wing Cmdr. Lance C. Wade, American ace of the RAF, who had the highest score of any fighter pilot in the Mediterranean theater—25 enemy planes destroyed—crashed to his death January 12 in Italy, it was announced today.

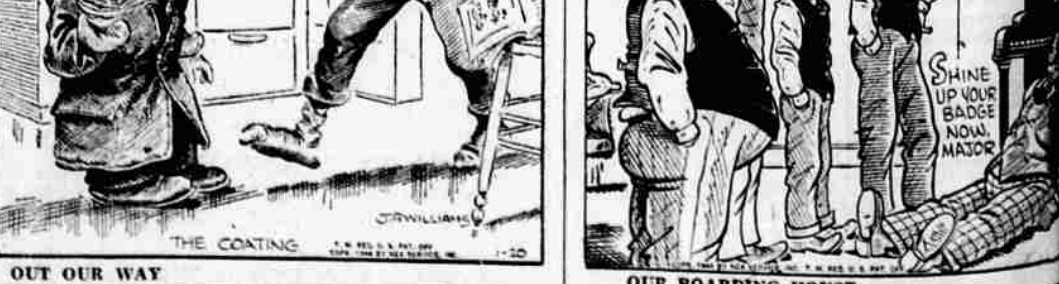
