Last year, the United States National bank was accorded the position of 37th largest among the nation's banks. Now, through its gain of approximately one hundred million dollars in the past year, it has stepped up to its present position.

Deposits as of Dec. 31, 1943, totaled \$390,055,770.82. In the three years since Dec. 31, 1940, the advance has been from 49th
