

Light Oregon Natives Fight Present War as Generals

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—War department lists show that eight natives are generals in the armed forces which are fighting the war in various fronts.

Department in giving out the list, they showed the birth of the generals but could not give their present addresses.

Gen. E. Boyd, born in Lebanon, Nov. 26, 1891, was listed as brigadier general (temporary) assistant division commander of the 93rd division. He served in the national guard in 1916.

Gen. James George Christie was born in Portland, 1887, and was graduated from West Point and commissioned lieutenant in the corps in 1918. He served

in the 27th flying training wing at Cochran, Ga.

Brig. Gen. Frederick McCabe was born in Port Stevens, Ore., February 9, 1891, and enlisted in the army as a private in 1914. In 1916 he was promoted to lieutenant, to captain in 1917 and to major (temporary) in 1918. He returned to his regular rank as captain in 1920 and in 1924 was promoted to major, to lieutenant colonel in 1938, to colonel (temporary) in 1941 and to brigadier general (temporary) in 1942 and assigned to an unannounced overseas post.

Brig. Gen. Robert Miller Montague was born in Portland August 7, 1899. He was graduated from West Point and was commissioned a second lieutenant of field artillery November 1, 1918. He served in Hawaii and returned to the United States as an artillery instructor. He came to Washington, D. C., in 1941 for duty with the general staff and was assigned to an unannounced overseas station.

Brig. Gen. Owen Summers was born in Portland, May 20, 1890, the son of Gen. Owen Summers, Sr., and joined the infantry reserve as a second lieutenant, entering active duty in 1917. He served in France in the first World War and was awarded the silver star for gallantry and after various assignments returned to the United States. In 1943 he became assistant division commander of the 80th division at Camp Young, Calif.

Brig. Gen. Leo Andrew Walton was born October 7, 1890, at Salem, Ore., was graduated from the United States Military Academy and commissioned a second lieutenant in cavalry in 1915. His first assignment was with the 10th cavalry at Fort Huachuca, Ariz., and he accompanied the Pershing expedition into Mexico in 1916. In 1920 he transferred to the air service and saw service in various parts of the country. He commanded the air corps advanced flying school at Stockton, Calif., in 1942 and was assigned to headquarters of the west coast air force training center at Santa Ana, Calif., as chief of staff.

Operation Scheduled For Wounded Officer

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—State policeman Karl Murphy, who was shot twice when he arrested a trio of AWOL sailors two weeks ago, was scheduled to undergo a bone operation today. He was shot in the left leg.

Meanwhile, the three sailors were in Polk county jail after waiving grand jury hearings yesterday. They were charged with assault and robbery while armed with a dangerous weapon. They were given time to enter pleas.

The sailors were arrested in a Salem hotel the morning after the shooting and gave their names as Byron N. Dyson of San Francisco, and Samuel Wells Jr. and Clarence Larson, both of Tacoma, and AWOL from the Bremerton navy yard.

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Plea to Dewey Seen

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—Congressional republican uneasiness over the persistence of Wendell L. Willkie's campaign for the party's presidential nomination caused speculation today on the possibility of persuading Gov. Thomas E. Dewey to become an avowed candidate.

Some anti-Willkie republicans believe it would be "hazardous" to permit Willkie to go to the republican national convention in Chicago next June unopposed by at least one widely supported and vigorous opponent. Implicit in that line of reasoning seem to be certain doubts regarding the progress of the presidential campaign of Gov. John W. Bricker of Ohio.

There is no antipathy to Bricker. But before getting behind him as the stop-Willkie candidate, some party leaders would like to see more evidence of a national trend in his direction in a good many states. Unless there are
