JUNCTION CITY, Jan. 26.—Eugene high's talented basketball squad won its second District 6 victory of the season in rather handy fashion here Tuesday night, bowling over Virgil Kingsley's game, but outclassed Junction City Tigers, 53 to 23.

Junction City put up a whale of a battle, and for its size, did a very creditable job under the bumbards. Time and again, the smaller Tigers would out-jump the Eugene high players. But the Tigers didn't have enough height, savvy, or shooting ability to keep stride with Coach Hank Kuchera's Eugene outfit when it got rolling.

The Axemen used a fast break to a great advantage, and the Junction defense could not cope with the tricky passing attack, leaving Eugene high players open repeatedly.

The Tigers couldn't buy a basket, but had to take most of their shots from a long distance. Eugene also had trouble connecting from the field at any distance, and both teams missed several close-in shots.

Faces Click, Defense Tight
Eugene's passing game was clicking again, and the boys played a good all-around floor game. The Axemen worked the ball in well, and had the Tigers tightly bottled up most of the time on defense.

Kuchera's boys "boomed" from the beginning, making 15 points in the opening quarter to four for Junction. Bob McKevitt scored a lay-in on a fast break to start the scoring, and field goals by Bill Elder, Jerry Holland, and a foul shot by Bill Hutchinson made the score seven for the Axemen before Don Davenport sank a foul shot, Junction's first point. Warren Hunter and Elder kept things moving for Eugene during the rest of the period, while Davenport added a fielder and a foul shot for all the Tiger counters.

Eugene was slowed down a little in the second quarter, but Dale Warberg made six of Eugene's 11 points during the session to keep things moving at a still fast pace. Junction added four more on buckets by Davenport and Wilmer Lyons—trailing 28 to 8 at half-time.

The Junction City boys were a little better in the third period, making 9 points, while Eugene made a like number.

But the Axemen opened up again in the final quarter, with Elder and McKevitt keeping things alive most of the time.

Davenport Collects 13
Davenport made 13 points despite the fact that Hutchinson, one of the best defensive guards in the valley, was on him like a hawk. Most of his attempts were long one-handers. For Junction, Larsen also played a stellar game, doing a superb job under the buckets.

Eugene looked good all around, and the entire squad deserves credit for the victory, playing an important part in setting up the scores. McKevitt looked especially good under the baskets for Eugene. Bill Elder had his one-hander, clipping the net in the last half, and took high point honors with 14 besides setting-up several additional scores and being another Axemen giant beneath the bucket.

It was one of the cleanest-played games in the district so far this year, with 11 fouls being called against Eugene and 7 against Junction. Little rough stuff was seen at any time. The Axemen did lose Hutchinson in the third period when the stellar guard suffered a charley horse in a scramble for the ball.

Coach Duane Mellem's undefeated 'B' squad, aided by several members of the sophomore team, made it a clean sweep for the Axemen by winning 43 to 25, after leading 21 to 11 at half-time. Bill Felps was high-point man for the winners with 12, while Don Anderson scored seven for the Tigers.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 26.—(AP)—Tired but jubilant, 10 University of Washington cagers plus the necessary entourage of coaches and managers are en route home today with the Husky basketball stock soaring at the top of the market.

Labeled "green" and "inexperienced" at the season's start with many observers predicting them lucky to win half of their contests, the freshman-packed civilian squad marked up its fourth consecutive road win last night, defeating Oregon State 42-36. The triumph was the Huskies' sixth straight conference win without defeat and leaves them 2½ games out in front of second-place Idaho.

Victory came to the Washington five actually in the first half when the Huskies potted 11 of 18 shots taken from the floor to hold a half-time lead at 23-12. Jack Nichols, center, and Al Mar, guard, topped the marksmen in this period, each making four for four.

The gap was widened at the start of the second half to 31-16 on a series of baskets by John Codd, Ron Haug and Nichols, but Happy Lee, Oregon State Chinese performer, sank six of his seven field goals to close the lead at 41-36 a minute before the gun.

Nichols ended up high man in the scoring column with 15 points, one more than was scored by Lee. All told, the Huskies sank 18 of an attempted 36 shots from the floor, with a 6 for 12 record from the foul line. Oregon State connected with 15 of 49 tosses but made 6 of 10 charity throws.

O.S.C. will return to the northern division game again this Saturday night, tackling Oregon on the local floor in a single contest. Idaho will play a single contest against Washington State at Moscow Saturday.

Washington will not play again until the following Friday and Saturday, Feb. 4-5, when the Oregon State Beavers come to Seattle for a return series.

Montgomery Blitzes Williams

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 26.—(AP)—Former Champion Bob Montgomery knocked out young Ike Williams, latest lightweight sensation, in the 12th round Tuesday before 15,000 fans at Convention hall, breaking the Convention, N. J., negro's winning streak at 33 consecutive victories.

Williams, who never had been knocked out before in 41 previous professional bouts, was counted out by Referee Bernie Sedor at 2:49 of the 12th and final scheduled round, as he lay half out of the ring, with his head almost resting on the ring-bell, and with his body draped over the lower strand of the ropes.

A smashing straight right to the chin plummeted the 20-year-old Trentonite for his third trip to the canvas in the 12th round. Just prior to the final descent, Williams had been floored for counts of eight and nine with right and left smashes to the head.

Williams, highly touted by some enthusiasts as a "throw-back to Joe Gans," was completely out of his class tonight against the bobbing and weaving former king of the lightweights (New York state version).

The United Press gave Williams only one round, the fifth, and scored the first as even. Montgomery won all the rest.

Tsacoff, Piluso to Wrestle Saturday

Tiger Tsacoff is a temperamental fellow, despite his 195 pounds. There are two things that bother him more than an opponent pulling his mustaches—one is to misspell his name; the other is to call him a Hungarian. "Hungarian, huh! Sounds like golosh. I'm a Bulgarian, I'll have you know," the grapping villain told a reporter here Wednesday—which has little or nothing to do with his semi-final engagement on Matchmaker Don Owen's weekly mat show at the Pearl Street arena Saturday night.

What is important, however, is that the Bulgarian means to be meeting an opponent somewhere near his own weight—Ernie Piluso, the barrel-chested Italian from Portland. Tsacoff lost to Wait Achu last week, but the villain said he was suffering from "train legs" and promised a terrific beating for any opponent he was matched against this week.

The signing of the Bulgarian and Italian adds more international flavor to the attractive program which will be featured by a match between Paavo Takonen, the Finnish scientist who holds the Pacific coast light-heavyweight championship, and Leo Karlinko, the "Mad Russian."

Although the headline will be a non-title affair, prospects of a Donnybrook are excellent. Karlinko, picking up the wartime flavor between the Finns and the Russians, has predicted he will brush Takonen off like so much dust. And local mat railbirds aren't too sure Karlinko won't do just that. The manner in which he accomplishes his threat is another matter—his tactics are certain to be on the unethical side.

Owen promises another all-star card and will announce the principals of the opening match tomorrow.

Webfoots Prepare For O.S.C. Game By 'Mail Order' Coaching

The University of Oregon varsity basketball team will play "mail order" basketball Saturday night at Corvallis where the Webfoots meet Oregon State College in the second of the annual four-game series.
