Fence Case Goes Up

The justice court case of the
state against Henry Christensen
and Robert Christensen, accused of
breaking down and destroying a
fence enclosing land not their
own, has been referred by Justice

of the Peace Howard M. Brownell
to the circuit court. Justice
Brownell held that the case in-
volved the question of title to real
property and that his court had no
jurisdiction.

The case was tried about two
weeks ago and a large number of
witnesses testified. The case in-

involved a fence between the Louie
Murdock place and the Lee Taylor
place south of Spencer Butte.
Henry Christensen admitted in
court that he removed the fence,
but claimed he had a right of way
through where it stood, by reason
of having for years driven his
cattle over this ground, which he
claimed was a part of a roadway
between his two places, which
were four and a half miles apart.
