Row Over Fascism Stirs Up House

WASHINGTON—Rep. John E. Rankin, (D., Miss.) has charged Rep. Samuel A. Weiss, (D., Pa.), "with offering the greatest insult in history to the house" if, as reported, he made a speech that there are "fascist blocs" in congress.

Weiss later flatly denied making such a statement.

His face red and waving a copy of a newspaper, Rankin shouted that he wanted "the gentleman from Pennsylvania" to insert in the record a copy of the speech in which the charges of fascism allegedly were made, so the house could act and have Weiss expelled.

Weiss' attempts to be heard were drowned out at first.

Later Weiss said on the floor, "I've always been accustomed to fair play and this remark reflects on my integrity."

"I never made a statement that this congress is a hotbed of fascism," said Weiss. "I said there were blocs of interests here affecting the prosecution of the war, but would not make such a remark as attributed to me."

Rankin interrupted, "Mr. Speaker, this article quotes him as saying there are fascist blocs in congress. I want to say now that a man who goes out of here and discusses congress in that manner has done a most serious injustice."

"Did you make a statement that three members of congress ought to be indicted?" Rep. Andrew J. May, (D., Ky.) asked Weiss.

"Ask him if he said there are fascist blocs in congress," Rankin interjected.

"No, sir, I never made that statement," Weiss replied.

The argument ended when Rep. Albert Gore, (D., Tenn.) urged that Weiss be given time on the floor at some future date to "fully outline" what he said in the address.

Log Brand Total Told

SALEM, Ore.—Only one half the companies cutting mill timber in western Oregon forests have registered tree identification brands, public utilities commissioner George H. Flagg said.

The log branding law was authorized by the 1943 legislature following heavy loss among Willamette valley lumbermen when booms broke and allowed logs to drift down river during the January, 1943, flood.

Flagg said 856 brands have been registered during the past seven months. He will advise Gov. Snell the commission is reserving 180 brands for woodsmen, millmen and contract cutters who have prior usage rights.

Flagg received a few filings from the lower Columbia, Astoria, Tillamook and Marshfield areas, but the majority were tendered by Willamette river district loggers.

Dog Wins Lawsuit

CHATTANOOGA — (AP) — A hound dog won a law suit here by sitting on his haunches and keeping his mouth shut.

Judge N. B. Hargraves of general sessions court invited J. B. Blalock and Hubert Harris from his bench to go with him on a 'possum hunt to settle ownership of a dog claimed by Harris and sought through replevin action by Blalock. Both had described the dog in detail correctly, differing in only one respect.

Harris testified that the dog never barked when his quarry was treed. Blalock testified that the dog did bark, both on the trail and under the tree.

The dog satisfied Judge Hargraves. The replevin was denied; Harris will keep the dog.

The judge didn't say who got the 'possum.

Tax Returns Spurred

WASHINGTON (AP) — The treasury has appealed to wage earners to begin filing out their income tax returns as soon as they receive wage and tax receipts from their employers.

With an estimated 50,000,000 returns expected before the March 15 deadline the department is seeking to avoid the usual last minute rush.

However, Harold N. Graves, acting internal revenue commissioner, said one of the most important reasons for early action is to determine how much tax must be paid.

"Some of you," he said in a message to taxpayers, "will owe a substantial amount, many will owe a small figure, others will get refunds. You owe it to yourself to find out at once about your own situation."

The fact that taxes have been deducted from paychecks under the pay-as-you-go system does not excuse taxpayers from making March 15 returns.

Driving Limit Seen

SACRAMENTO (AP) — A. T. Jergens, president of Jergens and Gilco Oil companies, predicted here at a meeting of the state lands commission that all pleasure driving on the west coast would be eliminated within six months.

"The situation on reserves of oil and also of natural gas is more critical than most people realize," Jergens declared.

Jergens said he understood that major oil companies had formed a joint fund of \$10,000,000 to send their best engineers to sections of South America to discover new sources of oil as a supplement to dwindling reserves in operating wells of the Americas.

Launching Marks Production Record

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 29—(AP) — The brightest construction record in merchant ship history—one that may well have turned the battle of supply for the United States — ended Friday with the launching of the Peter Moran.

The Moran, named for a Philadelphia artist, is the last Liberty freighter from the Henry J. Kaiser's Oregon Shipbuilding corporation — the 322d ship in just 32 months.

There is nothing like this record in previous history. Even Edgar F. Kaiser, Henry's son and general manager of the yard, did not think the feat possible.

When the 11-way yard was started in 1941, he estimated it would take two and one-half years to build the yard and deliver 32 ships. That was the established pace for conventional shipbuilding.

No one knew then that the mass production the Kaisers advocated would virtually revolutionize merchant shipbuilding. The aim at the start was 105 days for each ship. Before the end, the ships were being turned out in 30 days.

From the first Oregon set the pace for other crack yards turning out Liberties. After 18 months 100 had been built. Seven months more and the total was 200. Five months more, 300.

Then the yard began turning out construction of the faster Victory ship, the vessel expected to form the backbone of the post-war trade fleet.

Just how important this ship will be in the war is problematical. Only three have been launched and the yard does not expect to turn them out any faster than 50 days from keel-laying to delivery. The time now is around 100 days.

Northwest Aluminum Production Gauged

SEATTLE, Jan. 29. — (AP) — Daily production of 50 tons of alumina from Washington and Oregon clay deposits is anticipated within the next 10 months by backers of a proposed plant at Salem, Ore.

The announcement was made by Blakeslee Barnes, vice president of the Chemical Construction corporation, New York, while meeting with J. O. Gallagher, president of the Columbia Metals corporation, and C. F. Clise, who are arranging construction details.

The 50-ton production is only a small part of the 1500 to 2000 tons required daily by the five northwest alumina plants, Barnes said, but "if the process proves feasible in this demonstration plant, the first to produce alumina from clay on a commercial basis, moves will be made to expand to provide all the alumina for the five big plants."

4. Athletics. "Get into the most rigid boxing have ever known."
