**Post-War Jobs Put
Up To Business**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Gov.
John W. Bricker of Ohio has ad-
vised congress that he believes the
primary responsibility for the post-
war economy rests with private
enterprise, with a minimum of
governmental interference.

"Political ownership or man-
agement of business, of agricul-
ture, of commerce and of industry,
has no place in our free economy,
and the public interest does not
require it," he said.

His views were expressed in a
letter to Chairman Lanham (D.-
Tex.) of the house public build-
ings and grounds committee, now
studying post-war problems. Bric-
ker had been invited to appear
before the committee.

"I believe," he wrote, "that the
most effective way of building
confidence and providing high em-
ployment is through a free and
constantly expanding agricultural
and industrial system. This does
not mean that government will
cease to protect the public inter-
est. Regulation will be necessary
to prevent abuses.
"That is one of the purposes of
government."
