

JOHN M. HIGHTOWER
The American government's determination to see a just but pitiless peace has been strengthened by the enemy's ruthlessness in the treatment of prisoners, it was charged here, and some ranking officers are advocating a three-point program to strip the Japanese of their economic ability to make war again.
Points of this program are: deprive the Japanese of all industries which can be converted to munitions production; permit them to operate no marine or commercial ships and to possess no ships larger than 1,000 tons capacity; would limit their seafaring to fishing and small-crafting.
Allow them to engage fully in farming necessary to support population.
These purely economic measures, of course, the post-war government in Japan has agreed with its allies in the Pacific. These are to strip the Japanese of their empire of aggression and to punish criminals such as those responsible for atrocities inflicted on Americans in the Philippines.
Wants Bonins
In addition, there is a belief in circles that the United States has control of the Bonin or islands in that area for use as long as this is committed to help maintain peace in that part of the Pacific.
The Bonins lie in a chain south from Japan to the Guam-Bonin line is the Japanese strategic defense in the Pacific.
Talking now of measures to keep Japan from emerging as a new aggressor in the Pacific, military men feel that as the American learns more of the nature of the enemy they are fighting, they should give consideration to treatment of that enemy who is defeated.

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Peterson said an analysis of cash farm income indicating sources and trends for Oregon farms showed an aggregate income of \$220,000,000 for 1942, almost double the 1935-39 average of \$112,000,000. The 1926-30 average totaled \$123,000,000.

Cash crops, with grain and hay high on the list, were source of approximately half the Oregon farm income during the 16-year period. Animal products accounted for 48.6 per cent of the 1942 income, but accounted for 53.2 per cent in 1935-39.

Cash Crop Totals
Cash crops totaled \$113,000,000 in 1942, with grain and hay accounting for 13.8 per cent of the income; potatoes and truck crops accounted for 8.5 per cent; tree fruits and nuts, 8.2 per cent; forage seeds, 5.6 per cent and small fruits, special crops and farm timber products accounting for 15.3 per cent.

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In 1939, Oregon's total milk production, 1,364,000,000 pounds, was utilized 16.1 per cent on the farm. Three-tenths per cent farm-churned butter was sold; 38.7 per cent being released wholesale as cream and 38.5 per cent as milk, and 6.14 per cent going as retail milk and cream.

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"The Oregon farmer has a tremendous responsibility in producing food for a nation at war, and will continue to do more than his part," Peterson said. "The farmers' whole effort is not measurable in dollars and cents, but he should receive fair prices for his products."

**Supreme Court Frowns
On Child Martyrdom**

WASHINGTON—(UP)—In a split decision the supreme court held in effect that constitutional rights of freedom of worship do not permit religious zealots to make "martyrs" of their children.

The 5 to 4 decision was in a ruling on a Massachusetts case and held that state laws restricting street peddling by minors cover children distributing religious material of the Jehovah Witnesses sect.

Justice Frank Murphy in a separate dissenting opinion warned against any curbs on religious liberties and said that "religious freedom is too sacred a right to be restricted or prohibited in any degree without convincing proof that a legitimate interest of the state is in grave danger."

Associate Justice Wiley B. Rutledge delivered the majority opinion, holding that the states authority over children is broader than that over adults. A dissenting opinion was written by Justice Robert H. Jackson and concurred in by Justices Owen J. Roberts and Felix Frankfurter.

The symposium team is now composed of 11 members—Miss Pettis and Miss Brockway, Alice Hager; and Robert C. Stiles, all of Eugene; Beverly Carroll, Susan Stater, Don Hager, and Louise Fletcher, all of Portland; Esther Quier, Buxton; Dorris Weinberger, Klamath Falls; and Hugh King, Alvadore.

Three members of the team made a trip last week to Coos county, speaking before high schools and civic groups in Bandon, Coquille, Myrtle Point, North Bend, Marshfield and vicinity. Sunday Hager, and Misses Quier and Harter broadcast over station KSLM from Salem.

This coming week-end Don Hager, and Miss Pettis and Miss Brockway will make a trip to Astoria and vicinity. Interest is keen in the problem of juvenile delinquency, and requests have been received from all over the state to have members of the team appear at civic functions, high schools and church meetings, Clark said.

**Japan Would Present
Philippines to Spain**

CAIRO—(UP)—In an effort to prevent Spain from possibly breaking with the axis, Japan has offered Generalissimo Francisco Franco the Philippine Islands, "as soon as the war ends in a Japanese victory," it was reported in neutral sources today.

It was said that Japan desires Spain's moral assistance and intervention, meanwhile, in bringing about an end to guerrilla warfare in the islands and establishing order among the population, a large part of which is of Spanish descent.

Less Ice Cream Ahead

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 1.—(UP)—Ice cream will become even more scarce in Oregon and Washington.

The Northwest Retail Ice Cream Manufacturers' association voted at its annual meeting yesterday to curtail production further rather than decrease quality.

Output already was 65 per cent less than in 1941, the manufacturers said.

**California Assembly
Scores WRA Control**

SACRAMENTO, Calif.—(UP)—The California state assembly wants President Roosevelt and congress to "divest the war relocation authority of all jurisdiction and control" over the Tule Lake Japanese segregation center.

The legislature charged in a strongly worded resolution that the war department "and more particularly Robert B. Cozzens, western regional director, and Director R. Best" had followed a policy of "appeasement" toward internees and asked that either the army or the department of justice be given control of the center.

The legislature also charged that, under the WRA, internees had been permitted "to manufacture distilled spirits on the premises, to operate short wave radios, to wander out of camp without supervision and to make outside calls without censorship."

Sen. George J. Hatfield, R., Merced county, said it "is an affront to our people" to have the Tule Lake center returned to WRA control.
