

Kaiser Proposes Post-War Funds

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Henry J. Kaiser, west coast industrialist, Thursday urged immediate establishment of a federal revolving fund to aid communities in planning post-war projects.

He suggested a \$60,000,000 to \$100,000,000 fund as a start toward blueprinting highway, airport, bridge and other construction activities which would offset any decline in industrial employment at the war's end.

"The secret of full productive employment," he told the house public buildings and grounds committee, which is studying post-war problems, "is getting something done and not just talking about it."

The money advanced for planning under Kaiser's proposal, would be repaid by the communities.

Subjected to round-table questioning by members of the committee, Kaiser was asked by Rep. Mansack (D-Ala.):

"How many persons in your organization will be out of work when your war contracts are terminated?"

"We are not planning on how we can lay them off," Kaiser replied, "but how we can keep them on."

Closed Seasons Set On Columbia River

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 3.—(AP)—Closed seasons for commercial fishing in the Columbia river, set by the Oregon and Washington fish commissions, were announced here today by M. T. Hoy, master fish warden.

The river will be closed March 1-21; April 1-30; May 20-June 10; August 26-September 10; and December 15-January 29, 1945. All the closures begin and end at noon.

Commercial fishing also will be prohibited for a 30-hour weekly period from noon on Saturday to 6 p. m. on Sunday between March 1 and August 1; and for a 24-hour weekly period from 6 p. m. Saturday to 6 p. m. Sunday from August 2-25.

None of the closures applies to smelt or shad fishing.

Some Top Democrats Think Anti-FDR Campaign Futile

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Some democrats who have been active in party councils in the past will absent themselves from this year's national convention because they believe President Roosevelt will be nominated on the first ballot and concede that opposition is futile.

They have a feeling, in fact, that opposition to any move to renominate Roosevelt may be considerably less than it was in 1940.

Sen. Wheeler (D-Mont.) who opposed a fourth term as strongly as he did a third, said he had no intention of seeking a place as a convention delegate.

Wheeler led a successful fight within the platform committee for a "peace" plank that some administration leaders thought was in line with the president's views. He took no active part in the subsequent campaign.

"So far as I am concerned," Wheeler told a reporter, "I don't intend to go as a delegate to the Chicago convention."

"It looks now as if the president will be a candidate and if he is, he will be nominated."

even 100 increase in the number of school children. This year's census showed 5292 as compared with 5192 in 1942. Most all the districts adjacent to Eugene showed a gain, the figures show. Springfield's increase was 114, the 1943 figure being 1893 while in 1942 the count was 1779. Other nearby districts show the following: River Road, 467 in 1943 and 453 in 1942; Santa Clara, 329 in 1943 and 307 in 1942; Stella Maglady district, 275 in 1943 and 242 in 1942; Glenwood, 349 in 1943 and 305 in 1942; Bethel, 258 in 1943 and 278 in 1942 (decrease); Dunn, 218 in 1943 and 188 in 1942; Willakenzie, 214 in 1943 and 181 in 1942.

Cottage Grove school district showed an increase of 36. The 1943 figure was 971 and that of 1942 was 935. In the Junction City district 450 were counted in 1943 and 440 in 1942.

Many rural districts showed an increase while there was a decrease in others, the figures indicate.

American and French troops widened the breach in the Gustav line. Striking down the north, the Americans were less than a third of a mile from the stronghold and were assaulting it from two sides through heavy mortar and artillery fire, hurled from hidden emplacements inside the city.

Headquarters said the Rome beachhead had been enlarged and that a number of nazi counterattacks, mounted by reinforcements from north Italy, had been thrown back. One was west of Littoria.
