

Australian Chaplain Speaks Here

Col. F. J. Miles of London, England will conduct a conference in the First Baptist church beginning Sunday and continuing through Friday, February 11. During World War I, Colonel Miles was chief chaplain of the Australian forces and was twice decorated for meritorious service by the

Explosion Kills Men in England

LONDON, Feb. 5 (U.P.)—The war office announced today that six service men and four civilians were killed and eight persons were injured in an explosion during the loading of ammunition trucks at a railway station in northern England yesterday.

Some victims were reported to have been blown to bits. The explosion showered debris over a radius of miles and shook a considerable area. Traffic over the railway line was diverted.

Firemen were called in from neighboring towns to help army troops in fighting the resultant fires.

A number of Italian prisoners were working nearby, but it was not disclosed whether they were among the casualties.

Lack of Quorum Stops Vote Bill Until Monday

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5 (U.P.)—Lack of a quorum forced the senate into a recess today and postponed until next week a showdown on service vote legislation. Only 43 senators answered the roll for the unusual Saturday session. It takes 49 to transact business.

After a call of the absentees failed to bring in the necessary members, majority leader Barkley moved to quit until noon Monday.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 5 (U.P.)—General Douglas MacArthur was entered today as a candidate for the republican nomination for president in the Illinois April 11 primary.

W. F. McLaughlin, Glencoe, Ill., vice president of the MacArthur for President club, entered the general's name. He described the filing of nomination papers for the state's republican presidential preferential primary as a "purely draft movement." The petitions contained 5,000 signatures from 93 of the state's 102 counties.

The MacArthur petitions filed with the office of Secretary of State Edward P. Hughes were among the first to be presented on the opening day for filing of nominating papers for national state and district offices.
