Nursing Student Training Time Cut

Between 50 and 60 pre-nursing students enrolled at the University of Oregon are helping to meet the nation's requirements for nurses. It is necessary that 65,000 student nurses be enrolled in the United States by July 1, and this quota has not been reached, according to an announcement made Thursday by Miss Henrietta Doldz, acting director of the department of nursing education.

To increase the supply of nurses more quickly, a student may now receive her B.S. and R.N. degrees at the end of 45 months instead of the normal five years. Requirements on the university campus may be met in a minimum of four quarters instead of six, by the reduction of electives.

Financial aid will be given a nursing student, who has been accepted in the professional curriculum at a medical school, if she applies for enrollment in the United States cadet nurses corps, Miss Doldz said. Uniforms are furnished and all fees and maintenance expenses are paid. An allowance of \$15 for the first nine months, \$20 for the next 21 months and \$30 for the last three months is given. In addition, the only obligation of a cadet nurse is that she remain in nursing for the duration, either in civilian hospitals or in the armed forces.

No more than 30 of the 45 months training may be spent in classroom work, so the student spends her senior cadet period in a civilian or military hospital.

Student Will Get 'Seeing Eye' Dog

Harry Lipsit, Eugene, university senior, left this weekend on a trip he has planned for three years—destination, Morristown, N.J. In Morristown, Lipsit will meet and learn to handle the "seeing eye" dog he plans to bring back with him some time spring term, to accompany him from that time on to classes on the campus.

During his more than three years as a journalism major Lipsit has carried regular work and attended classes, guided only by fellow students and often "on his own." Maintaining an average GPA in spite of his handicap, he is now a senior in the university.

Acquiring a "seeing eye" dog, according to the blind student, is quite a complicated procedure. "You have to take almost as rugged a physical as the army exams," he explained. "I understand they try to fit the blind person temperamentally to the dog. Seems they have definite personalities."

About one day after Lipsit gets back from New Jersey, his dog will arrive in Eugene, via express. "I won't be able to name him—the trainers do that," he said, "but he'll go right into my classes with me. He'll be so well trained that he'll sit still."
