**At the Hellig:  
HIGHER AND HIGHER**  
It's only fair to admit that we  
entered the Hellig filled with Mis-  
souriian prejudice, wondering with  
no small curiosity what manner of  
man be this Frank Sinatra. With a  
rare brand of vocal groan, he had  
captivated half the feminine popu-  
lation of this country, leaving  
their pulses racing, their emotions  
vulnerable. We had resented it  
strongly.

Now, having seen the nation's  
No. 1 crooner in his first starring  
picture, we are ready to admit he  
is a shy and likable lad. If he is  
concealed, he doesn't show it in  
his role of a songwriter named  
Frank Sinatra, who—as a maid in  
the picture remarks—"looks just  
like a young fellow I heard on the  
radio." He becomes involved with  
the newly-poor piano manufactur-  
er next door (Leon Errol). The  
latter's eight servants (including  
Jack Haley) have formed a "cor-  
poration" to marry off one of their  
number, a scullery maid (Michele  
Morgan), to some rich gent so that  
all of them can make a little dough.

The swoon king has little act-  
ing to do, but he does it agreeably,  
and sings four songs, "The Music  
Stopped," "This Is a Lovely Way  
to Spend an Evening," "I Couldn't  
Sleep a Wink Last Night," and "I  
Saw You First."

Those who plan to take in  
"Higher and Higher" can be as-  
sured that they will see a pleas-  
ant comedy, that they thereby  
may become Sinatra fans if they  
aren't already, and that the Hellig  
is permitting no submissive sligh-  
ing such as that which uncooks  
from stooges attending his radio  
shows. The adolescents who  
squealed briefly Sunday after-  
noon, most of them male ex-  
hibitionists who were giving imi-  
tations, were asked by the ushers  
to shut up, please, so that the rest  
of the crowd could enjoy them-  
selves.

It goes without saying that Sin-  
atra never would win a scholar-  
ship at Juilliard, that he has no  
operatic potentialities, that he  
flats repeatedly and often sounds  
like a warped record on a run-  
down phonograph. But, for per-  
sonal appeal in voice, intimate in-  
sinnuation and all, the "Ooooooh  
Frankie" boy has got it. Maybe  
we're only human, but if we had  
to choose our music between him  
and that of some apologetic tenor  
adding variations to Wagner, we'd  
take our chances on Sinatra  
moanin' low.
