

Bond Sales Above
Million at Bank

Sale of war bonds at the Eugene First National bank in January amounted to \$1,198,363.50, according to a statement made out to Feb. 1.

Of this total, \$359,100, or maturity value of \$478,800 were in series E bonds; \$117,463.50, or maturity value of \$152,664.50 in series F bonds; \$324,200, maturity value of \$324,200, in series G bonds; \$397,600, maturity value of \$397,600, in series C bonds.

From May 1941 through January 1944, the bank reports bonds sold to the amount of \$10,000,290.50.

Civil Service Exam Set

The U. S. civil service has announced a new examination for substitute railway postal clerk to fill positions located throughout the United States and territories.

Salary is \$1850 a year plus approximately \$615 additional compensation. Applications must be filed not later than Feb. 29.

There is no maximum age limit and no experience required. A written examination includes a general test and mail tests in sorting, routing and following instructions. A limited number of women will be appointed for duty in terminal cities.

Post-War Land Use
Topic for Speaker

One of the most astute slogans coming out of this war is the one saying "five acres and a jeep," declared Ralph Beck, extension specialist in land use, Oregon State college, and state supervisor of emergency farm labor service, in talking to the Kiwanis club, Monday, on "Land Use in the Post-war Period."

Successful farming has to be on a more sound basis than that, he said, declaring the slogan to be "no impractical and so impossible." "Five acres and a jeep — as a hobby, all right, but for a living, NO!" he added.

The majority of the land use committees in the various counties in this area feel that the Willamette valley flood control project must be first on the list of jobs to complete when the war is over, because such a project will save much rich land, and it will enable farmers to look ahead and plan a long-time agricultural program, Beck said.

Rural electrification for farm communities is another primary need. Another fundamental element for the future development of agriculture is a large, steady, low-cost supply of limestone, the speaker continued.

Answering several general questions regarding the future of agriculture in western Oregon, Beck said, yes, there will be a "back to the soil movement," but it will be small because there are not many areas left for new development. The gain to agriculture will be in improvements for the land now in farms. This, however, will come as a slow development, not an overnight proposition.

Answering the question what farm lands will be worth, Beck stated one can only guess. One measuring stick, however, is productivity—can the land produce, and how much will it produce.

Already the "back to the land movement" is on, and the speaker half humorously remarked "there would be many fewer headaches if many types of business men would use their money to buy more war bonds instead of buying farm lands."

As to who can best guide in the problem of land use and betterment of agriculture, Beck said he believed the county agriculture councils. He gave high praise to the Lane county agricultural council, which has done outstanding work in its 25 years history. Such groups, which have in their membership, too, others who are not strictly farmers, are best equipped to work with public groups and build for a stable farm security, he added.
