There should be uniform program worked out by farm organizations he said.

Meat Supply Huge

E. L. Potter, of the school of economics at OSC, in a talk "Meat Marketing and the Dairy Industry" stated that the national meat supply was tremendous and that

1944 class for the biggest slaughter in the history of the country. Unless some governmental agency with authority and a reasonable plan straightens out the present jam there is going to be cattle left over until after the war when no buyers will take them, he declared.

Oregon dairymen lost several million dollars in 1943 on discarded dairy cows, he pointed out, and the same situation will hold in

1944, if indeed, it won't be worse. He blamed the low price on live animals in part to the government practice of buying its military quota exclusively from federally inspected plants, with the civilian two-thirds coming from the other plants.

Oregon in early 1943 had only three federal inspected plants and a big load was put upon these to handle meat for the armed forces. The non-federally inspected plants selling to civilians, not being willing to go through the red tape and other regulations necessary to become federal inspected plants, found themselves with meat piling up and therefore bought at less than worth of the animals, said

Potter. This meat pileup spread throughout the nation.

Liquidate Cows

In 1944 the government plans to liquidate 4,000,000 head of cattle and there will be a tremendous congestion from cows in this number, he stated. Another cause of low market price to dairymen was the OPA ceiling price on beef being the same every day of the year. To create equitable prices this shouldn't be, Professor Potter contended.

More efficient production than heretofore in marketing, advertising, breeding and management, was urged by Jack Nisbet, executive secretary of the American Jersey Cattle club. "Advertising

will be the lifesaver of the industry," Nisbet said. "If it is to meet competition." He denounced the drainage of manpower from dairy farms both by the armed forces and by the high wages of industry. The price of milk can't compete with shipyard wages, he said. The priority system administered by men who are uninformed of dairymen's needs was ridiculed by Nisbet. "You have to talk kindergarten language to get them to know what you're talking about," he said, "and those men write the regulations affecting the industry."

Dairy Demand Great

Today the demand for dairy products is so great that the industry can't meet the demands. America produces 119 billion pounds of milk annually and 25 per cent of this is taken by lend-lease. The demand will increase in the post-war period, Nisbet said, asserting that the dairy industry surpasses all other agriculture in importance, and this is due in a large part to the fact that America has become nutritious conscious.

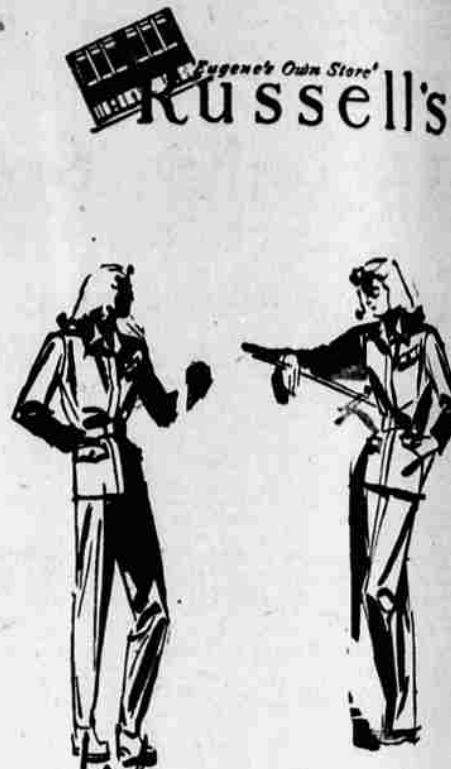
