March Welfare \$44,800
Estimate of expenditures of the Lane county welfare commission for public assistance in the month of March is \$800 more than the funds allotted for February, according to the report of Max L. Dudley, commission administrator, submitted at the regular meeting Thursday.

The total estimate for all purposes in March is \$44,800 as compared with \$44,000 for the present month. Under the head of general assistance, the amount allotted is \$7700. This is for a case load of 90 families and 145 single persons, a total of 235.

There are an estimated 1000 cases of old-age assistance for which \$29,000 is to be used; aid to dependent children, 50 cases, \$2000; blind assistance, 14 cases, \$475; administration costs, 3825; soldiers' and sailors' aid, \$300; county farm, \$800.
