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Truck Tires Restricted
PORTLAND—(AP)—The district OPA has clamped down on issuance of new truck tires, cancelling permits of all Multnomah county inspection stations.

Edmond W. Eggen, OPA mileage rationing representative, said only stations which meet stricter standards will be reauthorized to certify need for truck tires.

He said the rule would soon be applied to all of the OPA district in an attempt to ease a demand which exceeds production by more than 200,000 tires per month.

The regulation does not apply to passenger tires.

New Honey Standards
SALEM, Ore.—(AP)—The department of agriculture has announced new standards for liquid and crystallized honey will be effective February 15.

The new order would adjust the Oregon requirements to conform with federal grade terms, but otherwise make no change in grades.

The three grade classifications will be: U. S. grade A or U. S. fancy, U. S. grade B, and off-grade.

The order gives beekeepers and honey bottlers until June 1 to use old grade labels on hand.

OKLAHOMA Floats After Repairs of Dec. 7 Damage

PACIFIC FLEET BASE, Pearl Harbor, Feb. 12.—(AP)—The 29,000-ton U.S. battleship Oklahoma, left an oil-covered, smoking capsized hulk in Pearl Harbor after the Japanese sneak attack on Dec. 7, 1941, again is afloat and boasts her own captain, it was disclosed today.

A two-line announcement by Adm. Chester W. Nimitz disclosed that "The U.S. Oklahoma is once more afloat following an interval in drydock during which repairs to her hull were made."

It was a proud moment for the Pacific fleet and for United States on the morning when the Oklahoma, a rusted, oil-covered hulk of 41,000 dead-weight tons counting the massive patches on her torpedo-crushed sides, moved slowly down the Pearl Harbor channel and nosed into dry dock.

And none was prouder than her skipper, Commander Solomon Isquith, Brooklyn, N.Y., hero of the sunken target ship Utah.

By golly, she's moving," he grinned he as whistles of milling tugs shrieked a jubilant welcome. "I never thought I'd live to see this day. I hope we can sail her home under her own power."

Isquith received the navy cross for rescuing crew members of the sunken Utah, and now has been named captain of the Oklahoma following two years of spectacular salvage work. The Utah and the 29,700-ton Arizona now are the only ships of the 19 sunk or damaged at Pearl Harbor which have not yet been raised.

I was aboard the Oklahoma as she moved through the early morning gloom, looking like an ugly barge in the glare of searchlights from nearby shore installations, from the spot where the Japanese sank her in 1941 to her dry dock.

There were patches on her port side, 100 feet long at one place, and she was held up by pontoons
