Mr. and Mrs. James P. Graham were in Eugene from their home at Cottage Grove Saturday afternoon.

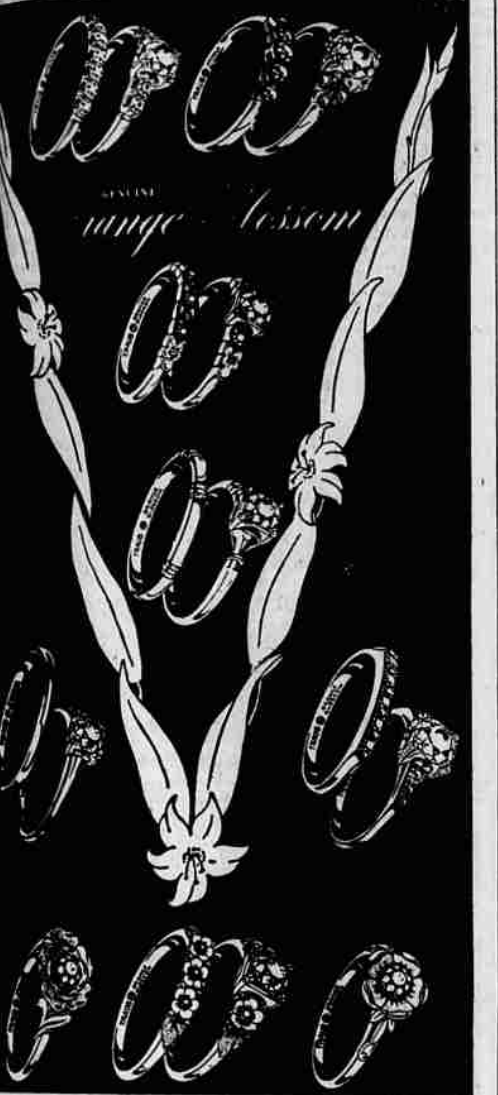

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**Writers Speak at Matrix Table Here**

Young writers were urged to take inspiration from America and keep faith with their heritage and not to copy the defeatism of Europe by Mrs. E. H. Hedrick (Helen Norcross Hedrick), Medford writer, speaking before the 12th annual Matrix table Friday evening at the Osburn hotel. More than 150 guests attended the formal dinner sponsored by Theta chapter of Theta Sigma Phi, women's national journalism honorary, at the University of Oregon.

The writer who gives faith to people will have done a wonderful and marvelous thing, Mrs. Hedrick said, not only for every one else but for himself mostly. In every civilization there is a crucial time in which man begins to analyze the worth of that civilization and wonder if it is worth while. At the present time men in the armed forces are turning toward religion, she pointed out, and as in every age, art and thought are allies of religion.

The charming guest speaker was introduced by Mrs. George Turnbull, Theta Sigma Phi adviser.

Mrs. Emma C. McKinney, publisher of the Hillsboro Argus, who will celebrate her fortieth anniversary as publisher in April, was presented with a scroll in recognition of her learning and distinction and newspaper service. Mrs. McKinney started in the newspaper business when she was 17 and upon her husband's death in 1900 returned to this work. Her talk to the newspaper women was an inspiration to each.

"I thought a few minutes ago what if I were starting my career instead of ending it. You girls are living in an era when women occupy every position. When I was a girl, the only occupations were dressmaking, clerking and millinery. Now men do some of the millinery."

"Another thing I envy you for is your advantage with a good school of journalism. When I started I don't think the word journalism was in my vocabulary. What I learned I learned the hard way. I learned to set type by hand. I also learned to be pressman and do various other things about the shop, and I even learned to run a linotype."

Mrs. McKinney related that one of the happiest moments of her life was when her son finished college in 1923 and came into the business with her. "It has been a wonderful partnership and I have enjoyed every moment of it."

Music was furnished by Marie Roglund, Portland, singing "Ave Maria" and "Caro Nome" from Verdi's opera Rigoletto. She was accompanied by Miss Ruth Baker, Bend.
