attacks to break through the wide steel band, crushing the life from the encircled veterans, were repulsed. Berlin said the Russians were attacked heavily near Dubno, in old Poland, 83 miles northeast of Lwow; at Narva, nine miles south of Estonia; and at the white Russian rail center of Vitebsk.

Allied air fleets including American Fortresses and Liberators pummeled the French invasion coast yesterday for the 41st time in 55 days, destroying seven German planes; at the cost of four heavy bombers and two fighters.

Jugoslav royalist parties were said by the exiled government to have met in the mountains and reaffirmed loyalty to King Peter, the monarch whom Marshal Tito has forbidden to return. The royalists also demanded post-war expansion at the expense of Italy and Balkan countries. Tito said Germany had opened a new offensive and was being aided by Gen. Mihailovic, Peter's minister of war.

Snowfall Continues
PENDLETON, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Fairly heavy snowfall throughout this district last night and this morning added eight inches at Meacham in the Blue mountains and blanketed Pendleton with a little more than an inch. The snow was still falling at mid-day. Some roads were reported blocked in the mountain regions near Weston but travel was unimpeded on all county and state highways.

Precipitation here Sunday was .11 of an inch, with .07 of an inch added today.

ment and development committee, told the delegates that the Oregon committee's underlying philosophy is one of community emphasis. The committee is not a controlling agent but a stimulating one, he said. It mobilizes ideas from the entire state, tabulates them and then passes them on to other communities.

The post-war situation will be one in which a whole series of immediate problems will have to be handled, Morris said. These problems will not only be those relating to employment but will involve other innumerable details affecting the whole fabric of society.

The Pacific coast problem of readjustment will come much later than that of the Atlantic, Morris emphasized, and this will create additional problems.

Secretary of State Robert S. Farrel, Jr. opened the afternoon's session with a report on Oregon's safety program. Other phases of Oregon's post-war planning were touched upon during the afternoon by state, civic, commercial and industrial representatives.

HAPPY LAND
Before anyone mentions that there are slight similarities in the plot of this film and that of "The Human Comedy," it would be convenient to point out that MacKinlay Kantor's "Happy Land" was published before the Saroyan story was. Simply it tells of the effects on Lew and Agnes Marsh (Don Ameche and Frances Dee) when their son Rusty (Richard Crane) is killed on duty in the Pacific. With the spiritual help of his grandfather (Harry Carey), the father recalls the happy days he knew when the boy was alive, and the path into the future becomes more clear.

Don Ameche gives his best performance yet. The work of Ann Rutherford, as Rusty's girl friend, and Frances Dee is given no great prominence, but they register a definable warmth, as does Carey, whose portrayals always are without strain.

In its memory-book summary, "Happy Land" perhaps contains too many short scenes, but they have a power which accumulates in the words of Grampa as he tries to give Rusty's logic to life, though it be shortened: As long as we can have Boy Scouts, who'd do a good deed a day... as long as boys can play Indian in the corn, and enjoy a full life... it will be worthwhile.

The spoken reason may seem too plain, incomplete, as incomprehensible as a death telegram. Its simplicity cannot encompass the whole directive, it is only a guidepost to acceptance. But it bears a full measure of truth, persuading man to abandon bitterness, to be thankful for the happiness he has had, and to consider no breaths wasted if they have yielded some bounty of joy.

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 14.—(AP)—An expectancy of some concrete development in Finnish-Russian relations, perhaps within the next two or three days, was evident here today despite the lack of any official indication that Finland actually was seeking a way out of the war.

From Helsinki came a report that the Finnish capital was awaiting momentarily some definite governmental step toward peace as the social democratic party continued heavy pressure on the nation's leaders to seek terms.

Speculation that something may be afoot was given a fresh flip yesterday by the arrival here by plane of Leo Ehrhard, Finnish minister of the interior. He had been preceded to Stockholm by Juhani Paasikivi, who helped negotiate the peace treaty that ended the Finnish-Russian war of 1939-40, and Elias Erkkio, former Finnish foreign minister.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The house today agreed to send the Commodore Credit corporation bill, which bans most food subsidies after June 30, to conference and the conferees were granted until midnight to file a report.
