Treaty Submitted

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Roosevelt has sent to the Senate for ratification a treaty between the United States and Mexico regarding joint use and conservation of the waters of the Rio Grande, Colorado and Tijuana rivers. The treaty first will be considered by the Senate foreign relations committee, which specifically allocates the waters of the three rivers to the two countries, and provides for joint international uses in the following categories: domestic municipal uses, agriculture, stock raising, electric power, industrial uses, navigation, fishing, hunting, and any other use determined by the international boundary and water commission.

Holman Says He's Been Misquoted

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Sen. Holman (R-Ore.) has told the Senate he is being misquoted in a "fictitious person" and put into the Senate record correspondence which he said would permit postal officials to investigate whether the mails had been used to defraud.

"I charge specifically," said Holman, "that Paul Dunham, the name appearing on a syndicated news column distributed to a number of papers in the Northwest, is a fictitious character."

The senator said he was unable to find anyone here who knew "Paul Dunham," that he was not accredited to the congressional press galleries and that none of the Oregon members of Congress knew him.

"It would appear that the column is in fact prepared in Portland (Ore.) but distributed under a Washington dateline. My attention has been called to a number of false news articles appearing in this column and in the Oregon Voter," Holman said. "I am making this record so federal postal authorities can take cognizance to ascertain if there has been a violation of those postal regulations which prohibit the use of the mails to defraud."

President Hints U.S. Printing Nazi Money

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Roosevelt told a press-radio conference that he would not be a bit surprised if the United States was printing some German currency for use on the European continent.

The president made the remark in response to a question. A twinkle in his eye made it difficult to determine just how serious he was.

But he did say that this country had been printing currency for several nations in Europe. Some of these countries have been occupied, some are being occupied and others will be, he asserted.

Roosevelt discussed the subject in answer to a question whether the fact that French currency is being printed here would enable him to discuss the possibility of future operations in Europe.

Water Shortage Feared

BEND — (AP) — Mountain areas, despite a recent heavy snowfall in the high central Oregon Cascades, are so short of moisture that farmers were warned of an insufficient 1944 water supply.

The lack of snow, however, may be offset by a heavy hold-over stored in central Oregon reservoirs, sufficient to irrigate central Oregon provided the winter dry spell does not continue through the year.

McIntire Predicts Three Years of War

CHICAGO — (AP) — Three years more of war, with every inductee scheduled for full-time combat duty, was predicted here by Rear Adm. Ross T. McIntire, surgeon general of the navy and personal physician to the president.

McIntire, speaking of the return to civilian life of army doctors, told a meeting sponsored by the American Medical Association that "it would be safe to plan on three more years of war."

"I would like to say that the year following the end of the war we will be able to release two-thirds of the physicians in service to civilian life," McIntire said, "but this is very doubtful. If we are going to hold the peace we will have a world wide responsibility to our troops of occupation and to the civilian populations of the occupied countries."

An indication that induction examinations for selective service registrants would be stricter was seen in McIntire's statement that "from now on a man who goes into service, either army or navy, must be able to do full-time combat duty, because he will be a replacement."
