MEATS AND FATS
February 13—Brown stamp Y, Book 3, became valid.
February 18—"Spares" stamp 3, Book 4, became valid for five points' worth of pork or sausage, through February 26. Not good for lard.
February 26—Brown stamps V, W, and X, Book 3, expire.
PROCESSED FOODS
February 20—Green stamps G, H, and J, Book 4, expire.
March 20—Green stamps K, L, and M, Book 4, expire.
SUGAR
February 1—Sugar stamp 40, Book 4, became valid for five pounds' canning sugar.
March 31—Sugar stamp 30, Book 4, for five pounds, expires.
SHOES
Stamp 18, Book 1, and Airplane stamp 1, Book 3, each good indefinitely for one pair of shoes.
FUEL OIL
March 14—Period 3 coupons expire. Period 4 coupons, also good now, expire September 30.
GASOLINE
March 21—No. 10 stamps in A Book expire at midnight.
TIRES
February 28—Next tire inspection deadline for holders of B and C books. A-book deadline March 31. T book tire inspection every 6 months or 5,000 miles of driving.

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

ALL Dogs in Lane County must be licensed before March 1st or a penalty of one dollar will be added during March. An additional 25c will be added for each month until July 1st.

Parcel Mailing To Army Outlined

Army regulations on mailing parcels to army personnel were reviewed Friday by Postmaster F. L. Armitage of Eugene, who stated that Eugeneans must keep such rules in mind in the interest of military transportation.

The postmaster emphasized that anyone mailing packages to a person in the army must have a request from that person, and that not more than one parcel may be mailed in any one week to the same member of the armed forces by or in behalf of the same mailer.

It was further pointed out by Postmaster Armitage that a parcel cannot exceed five pounds, and must not be more than 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. The parcel, furthermore, must be well and strongly packed, in a container of metal, wood, strong fiber board, or similar material, then wrapped in strong paper and tied with twine. The cover should be such that it can be opened readily for censorship. Contents should be packed tightly. Parcels must not contain food, except hard candies and salted peanuts, and these must be in metal containers.

The postmaster explained that these mailing regulations apply to the navy, marines and coast guard, with the one exception that these services do not require a request as in the case of the army.
